



Safety Precautions

- Before using the product, please ensure that you read the safety precautions described below. Always ensure that the product is used correctly.
- The safety precautions noted on the following pages are intended to prevent injuries to yourself and other persons, or damage to the equipment.
- Be sure to also check the guides included with any separately sold accessories you use.



Denotes the possibility of serious injury or death.

- Do not trigger the flash in close proximity to people's eyes. Exposure to the intense light produced by the flash could damage eyesight. In particular, remain at least 1 meter (39 inches) away from infants when using the flash.
- Store this equipment out of the reach of children and infants.

 Strap: Putting the strap around a child's neck could result in asphyxiation.
- Use only recommended power sources.
- Do not attempt to disassemble, alter or apply heat to the product.
- Avoid dropping or subjecting the product to severe impacts.
- To avoid the risk of injury, do not touch the interior of the product if it has been dropped or otherwise damaged.
- Stop using the product immediately if it emits smoke, a strange smell, or otherwise behaves abnormally.
- Do not use organic solvents such as alcohol, benzine, or thinner to clean the product.
- Do not let the product come into contact with water (e.g. sea water) or other liquids.
- Do not allow liquids or foreign objects to enter the camera.

This could result in electrical shock or fire.

If liquids or foreign objects come into contact with the camera interior, immediately turn the camera off and remove the battery.

If the battery charger becomes wet, unplug it from the outlet and consult your camera distributor or a Canon Customer Support Help Desk.

- Use only the recommended battery.
- Do not place the battery near or in direct flame.
- Unplug the power cord periodically, and using a dry cloth, wipe away any dust and dirt that has collected on the plug, the exterior of the power outlet, and the surrounding area.
- Do not handle the power cord with wet hands.
- Do not use the equipment in a manner that exceeds the rated capacity of the electrical outlet or wiring accessories. Do not use if the power cord or plug are damaged, or not fully plugged into the outlet.
- Do not allow dirt or metal objects (such as pins or keys) to contact the terminals or plug.

The battery may explode or leak, resulting in electrical shock or fire. This could cause injury and damage the surroundings. In the event that a battery leaks and the battery electrolyte contacts eyes, mouth, skin or clothing, immediately flush with water.

- Turn the camera off in places where camera use is prohibited.
 The electromagnetic waves emitted by the camera may interfere with the operation of electronic instruments and other devices. Exercise adequate caution when using the camera in places where use of electronic devices is restricted, such as inside airplanes and medical facilities.
- Do not play the supplied CD-ROM(s) in any CD player that does not support data CD-ROMs.

It is possible to suffer hearing loss from listening with headphones to the loud sounds of a CD-ROM played on an audio CD player (music player). Additionally, this could damage the speakers.



Denotes the possibility of injury.

- When holding the camera by the strap, be careful not to bang it, subject it to strong impacts or shocks, or let it get caught on other objects.
- Be careful not to bump or push strongly on the lens.

This could lead to injury or damage the camera.

Be careful not to subject the screen to strong impacts.
 If the screen cracks, injury may result from the broken fragments.

 When using the flash, be careful not to cover it with your fingers or clothing.

This could result in burns or damage to the flash.

- Avoid using, placing or storing the product in the following places:
 - Places subject to strong sunlight
 - Places subject to temperatures above 40 °C (104 °F)
 - Humid or dusty areas

These could cause leakage, overheating or an explosion of the battery, resulting in electrical shock, fire, burns or other injuries.

High temperatures may cause deformation of the camera or battery charger casing.

 The slideshow transition effects may cause discomfort when viewed for prolonged periods.

Caution

Denotes the possibility of damage to the equipment.

 Do not aim the camera at bright light sources (such as the sun on a clear day).

Doing so may damage the image sensor.

 When using the camera on a beach or at a windy location, be careful not to allow dust or sand to enter the camera.

This may cause the product to malfunction.

 In regular use, small amounts of smoke may be emitted from the flash.

This is due to the high intensity of the flash burning dust and foreign materials stuck to the front of the unit. Please use a cotton swab to remove dirt, dust or other foreign matter from the flash to prevent heat build-up and damage to the unit.

- Remove and store the battery when you are not using the camera.
 If the battery is left inside the camera, damage caused by leakage may occur.
- Before you discard the battery, cover the terminals with tape or other insulators.

Contacting other metal materials may lead to fire or explosions.

- Unplug the battery charger from the power outlet after charging is complete, or when you are not using it.
- Do not place anything, such as cloth, on top of the battery charger while it is charging.

Leaving the unit plugged in for a long period of time may cause it to overheat and distort, resulting in fire.

Do not place the battery near pets.

Pets biting the battery could cause leakage, overheating or explosion, resulting in fire or damage.

- When putting the camera in your bag, ensure that hard objects do not come into contact with the screen.
- **Do not attach any hard objects to the camera.**Doing so may cause malfunctions or damage the screen.


Prepare for shooting as follows.

Attaching the Strap



1 Attach the strap.

- Attach the included strap to the camera as shown.
- On the other side of the camera, attach the strap the same way.



2 Attach the lens cap to the strap.

- Remove the lens cap from the camera and attach the lens cap cord to the strap.
- Always remove the lens cap before turning the camera on.
- Keep the lens cap on the lens when the camera is not in use.



Holding the Camera




- Place the strap around your neck.
- When shooting, keep your arms close to your body and hold the camera securely to prevent it from moving. If you have raised the flash, do not rest your fingers on it.

Charging the Battery

Before use, charge the battery with the included charger. Be sure to charge the battery initially, because the camera is not sold with the battery charged.









Remove the battery cover and insert the battery in the charger.

Remove the cover from the battery, align the ▲ marks on the battery and charger, and insert the battery by pushing it in (①) and down (②).

Charge the battery.

- CB-2LY: Flip out the plug (①) and plug the charger into a power outlet (②).
- CB-2LYE: Plug the power cord into the charger, then plug the other end into a power outlet.
- The charging lamp turns orange and charging begins.
- When the charging is finished, the lamp turns green.

3 Remove the battery.

 After unplugging the battery charger, remove the battery by pushing it in (①) and up (②).




- To protect the battery and keep it in optimal condition, do not charge it continuously for more than 24 hours.
- For battery chargers that use a power cord, do not attach the charger or cord to other objects. Doing so could result in malfunction or damage to the product.



 For details on charging time and the number of shots and recording time possible with a fully charged battery, see "Specifications" (217).

Inserting the Battery and Memory Card

Insert the included battery and a memory card (sold separately). Note that before using a new memory card (or a memory card formatted in another device), you should format the memory card with this camera (\$\subseteq\$160).




1 Check the card's write-protect tab.

Recording is not possible on memory cards with a write-protect tab when the tab is in the locked (downward) position. Slide the tab up until it clicks into the unlocked position.



2 Open the cover.

Slide the cover (1) and open it (2).



3 Insert the battery.

- While pressing the battery lock in the direction of the arrow, insert the battery as shown and push it in until it clicks into the locked position.
- If you insert the battery facing the wrong way, it cannot be locked into the correct position. Always confirm that the battery is facing the right way and locks when inserted.



4 Insert the memory card.

- Insert the memory card facing as shown until it clicks into the locked position.
- Make sure the memory card is facing the right way when you insert it. Inserting memory cards facing the wrong way may damage the camera.



5 Close the cover.

Lower the cover (①) and hold it down as you slide it, until it clicks into the closed position (②).



For guidelines on how many shots or hours of recording can be saved on one memory card, see "Specifications" (217).

Removing the Battery and Memory Card



Remove the battery.

- Open the cover and press the battery lock in the direction of the arrow.
- The battery will pop up.



Remove the memory card.

- Push the memory card in until it clicks, and then slowly release it.
- The memory card will pop up.

Setting the Date and Time

Set the current date and time correctly as follows if the [Date/Time] screen is displayed when you turn the camera on. Information you specify this way is recorded in image properties when you shoot, and it is used when you manage images by shooting date or print images showing the date. You can also add a date stamp to shots, if you wish (\$\subseteq\$65).



1 Turn the camera on.

- Press the ON/OFF button.
- ▶ The [Date/Time] screen is displayed.





Set the date and time.

- Press the <**◀**><**▶**> buttons to choose an option.
- Press the <▲><▼> buttons or turn the <∅> dial to specify the date and time.
- When finished, press the <(FUNC) > button.





Press the <◀><▶> buttons or turn the <∅> dial to choose your home time zone.



4 Finish the setup process.

- Press the <(**)> button to complete the setting. The setting screen is no longer displayed.
- To turn off the camera, press the ON/OFF button.

Unless you set the date, time, and home time zone, the [Date/ Time] screen will be displayed each time you turn the camera on. Specify the correct information.



To set daylight saving time (1 hour ahead), choose $[\frac{1}{\sqrt{16}}]$ in step 2 and then choose $[\frac{1}{\sqrt{16}}]$ by pressing the <

Changing the Date and Time

Adjust the date and time as follows.



1 Access the camera menu.

Press the <MENU> button.

2 Choose [Date/Time].


- Move the zoom lever to choose the [f†] tab.
- Press the <▲><▼> buttons or turn the <∅> dial to choose [Date/Time], and then press the <∰> button.

3 Change the date and time.

- Press the <MENU> button to close the menu.



- Date/time settings can be retained for about 3 weeks by the camera's built-in date/time battery (backup battery) after the battery pack is removed.
- The date/time battery will be charged in about 4 hours once you insert a charged battery or connect the camera to an AC adapter kit (sold separately, 171), even if the camera is left off.
- Once the date/time battery is depleted, the [Date/Time] screen will be displayed when you turn the camera on. Follow the steps on 222 to set the date and time.



The display language can be changed as needed.

Access the setting screen.





- Press the <▲><▼><√>> buttons or turn the <∅> dial to choose a language, and then press the <∰> button.
- Once the display language has been set, the setting screen is no longer displayed.





- The current time is displayed if you wait too long in step 2 after pressing the <\epsilon\) button before you press the <MENU> button. In this case, press the
- > button to dismiss the time display and repeat step 2.
- You can also change the display language by pressing the <MENU> button and choosing [Language [3]] on the [11] tab.

Trying the Camera Out

Follow these instructions to turn the camera on, shoot still images or movies, and then view them.

Shooting (Smart Auto)

For fully automatic selection of the optimal settings for specific scenes, simply let the camera determine the subject and shooting conditions.



1 Turn the camera on.

- Press the ON/OFF button.
- The startup screen is displayed.



2 Enter < (AUIO) > mode.

- Set the mode dial to <AUTO>.
- Aim the camera at the subject. The camera will make a slight clicking noise as it determines the scene.
- Icons representing the scene and image stabilization mode are displayed in the upper right of the screen.
- Frames displayed around any detected subjects indicate that they are in focus.




3 Compose the shot.

To zoom in and enlarge the subject, move the zoom lever toward < □ (telephoto), and to zoom away from the subject, move it toward < □ (wide angle).









4 Shoot.

Shooting Still Images

1)Focus.

- Press the shutter button lightly, halfway down. The camera beeps twice after focusing, and green frames are displayed to indicate image areas in focus.
- If [Raise the flash] is displayed, lift the flash with your finger to prepare it for use. If you prefer not to use the flash, push it down with your finger, into the camera.

⁽²⁾Shoot.

- Press the shutter button all the way down.
- As the camera shoots, a shutter sound is played, and in low-light conditions when you have raised the flash, it fires automatically.
- Keep the camera still until the shutter sound ends.
- Your shot remains displayed on the screen for about two seconds
- Even while the shot is displayed, you can take another shot by pressing the shutter button again.

Shooting Movies

1)Start shooting.

- Press the movie button. The camera beeps once as recording begins, and
 [•Rec] is displayed with the elapsed time.
- Black bars displayed on the top and bottom edges of the screen indicate image areas not recorded.
- Frames displayed around any detected faces indicate that they are in focus.
- Once recording begins, you can take your finger off the movie button.

2Finish shooting.

 Press the movie button again to stop shooting. The camera beeps twice as recording stops.

Viewing

After shooting images or movies, you can view them on the screen as follows





- Press the < > button.
- > Your last shot is displayed.




2 Browse through your images.


- To view the previous image, press the <¶> button or turn the <∅> dial counterclockwise. To view the next image, press the <₱> button or turn the <∅> dial clockwise.
- Press and hold the <◀><>> buttons to browse through images quickly. Images appear grainy at this time.



To access Scroll Display mode, turn the
 dial rapidly. In this mode, turn the
 dial to browse through images.











Volume

3 Play movies.

- Press the <∰> button to access the movie control panel, choose [▶] (either press the <**4**><**>**> buttons or turn the <**0**> dial), and then press the <**∅**> button again.
- Playback now begins, and after the movie is finished, [SED ♣] is displayed.
- To adjust the volume, press the <▲><▼> buttons.



To switch to Shooting mode from Playback mode, press the shutter button halfway.

Erasing the Images

You can choose and erase unneeded images one by one. Be careful when erasing images, because they cannot be recovered.

1 Choose an image to erase.

Press the <**√**><**▶**> buttons or turn the <**○**> dial to choose an image.

2 Erase the image.

- Press the <m> button.
- After [Erase?] is displayed, press the <◄><▶> buttons or turn the <⑥> dial to choose [Erase], and then press the <∰> button.
- The current image is now erased.
- To cancel erasure, press the <**◀**><**▶**> buttons or turn the <**⑤**> dial to choose [Cancel], and then press the <**⑥**> button







You can also erase all images at once (Q137).



Included Software, Manuals





With the camera turned off, open the cover (①). With the smaller plug of the included interface cable (□2) in the orientation shown, insert the plug fully into the camera terminal (②).





- Insert the larger plug of the interface cable in the computer's USB port. For details about USB connections on the computer, refer to the computer user manual.
- 4 Install the files.
 - Turn the camera on, and follow the on-screen instructions to complete the installation process.
 - The software will connect to the Internet to update to the latest version and download new functions. Installation may take some time, depending on computer performance and the Internet connection.
 - Click [Finish] or [Restart] on the screen after installation and remove the CD-ROM when the desktop is displayed.
 - Turn the camera off and disconnect the cable.



- When not connected to the Internet, there are the following limitations.
- The screen in step 3 will not be displayed.
- Some functions may not be installed.
- The first time you connect the camera to the computer, drivers will be installed, so it may take a few minutes until camera images are accessible.
- If you have several cameras that were bundled with ImageBrowser EX on the included CD-ROMs, be sure to use each camera with their included CD-ROM and follow the on-screen installation instructions for each. Doing so will ensure that each camera will receive the correct updates and new functions via the auto update function.

Saving Images to a Computer

Windows 7 and Mac OS X 10.6 are used here for the sake of illustration.



Shooting Mode

- Press the ON/OFF button to turn the camera on and prepare for shooting.
- To turn the camera off, press the ON/OFF button again.

Playback Mode

- Press the < >> button to turn the camera on and view your shots.
- To turn the camera off, press the
button again.



- To switch to Playback mode from Shooting mode, press the <>> button.
- To switch to Shooting mode from Playback mode, press the shutter button halfway (\square 43).
- The lens will be retracted after about one minute once the camera is in Playback mode. You can turn the camera off when the lens is retracted by pressing the < >> button.



Power-Saving Features (Auto Power Down)

As a way to conserve battery power, the camera automatically deactivates the screen (Display Off) and then turns itself off after a specific period of inactivity.

Power Saving in Shooting Mode

The screen is automatically deactivated after about one minute of inactivity. In about two more minutes, the lens is retracted and the camera turns itself off. To activate the screen and prepare for shooting when the screen is off but the lens is still out, press the shutter button halfway ($\square 43$).

Power Saving in Playback Mode

The camera turns itself off automatically after about five minutes of inactivity.



- Adjust the timing of automatic camera and screen deactivation as needed (\(\subseteq\) 163).


To ensure your shots are in focus, always press the shutter button lightly (halfway) initially. Once the subject is in focus, press the button all the way down to shoot.

In this manual, shutter button operations are described as pressing the button *halfway* or *all the way down*.



1 Press halfway. (Press lightly to focus.)

Press the shutter button halfway. The camera beeps twice, and AF frames are displayed around image areas in focus.



Press all the way down. (From the halfway position, press fully to shoot.)


- The camera shoots, as a shutter sound is played.
- Keep the camera still until the shutter sound ends.



- Images may be out of focus if you shoot without initially pressing the shutter button halfway.
- Length of shutter sound playback varies depending on the time required for the shot. It may take longer in some shooting scenes, and images will be blurry if you move the camera (or the subject moves) before the shutter sound ends.

Shooting Modes

Use the mode dial to access each shooting mode.





You can turn the mode dial to switch to Shooting mode from Playback mode.

Shooting Display Options

Press the <DISP> button to view other information on the screen, or to hide the information. For details on the information displayed, see 222.





- Screen brightness is automatically increased by the night display function when you are shooting under low light, making it easier to check how shots are composed. However, on-screen image brightness may not match the brightness of your shots. Note that any on-screen image distortion or jerky subject motion will not affect recorded images.



- Press the shutter button all the way down.

- A flashing [Q] icon warns that images are more likely to be blurred by camera shake. In this case, mount the camera on a tripod or take other measures to keep it still.
- If your shots are dark despite the flash firing, move closer to the subject. For details on the flash range, see "Specifications" (217).
- The subject may be too close if the camera only beeps once when you press the shutter button halfway. For details on the focusing range (shooting range), see "Specifications" (217).
- To reduce red-eye and to assist in focusing, the lamp may be activated when shooting in low-light conditions.
- A blinking [\$] icon displayed when you attempt to shoot indicates that shooting is not possible until the flash has finished recharging. Shooting can resume as soon as the flash is ready, so either press the shutter button all the way down and wait, or release it and press it again.

Before shooting a movie, lower the flash with your finger. Be careful not to touch the microphone when shooting a movie. Leaving the flash raised, or blocking the microphone may prevent audio from being recorded or may cause the recording to sound muffled.

 Avoid touching camera controls other than the movie button when shooting movies, because sounds made by the camera will be recorded.

On-Screen Frames

A variety of frames are displayed once the camera detects subjects you are aiming the camera at.

- A white frame is displayed around the subject (or person's face) determined by the camera to be the main subject, and gray frames are displayed around other detected faces. Frames follow moving subjects within a certain range to keep them in focus.
 - However, if the camera detects subject movement, only the white frame will remain on the screen.


Zooming In Closer on Subjects (Digital Zoom)

When distant subjects are too far away to enlarge using the optical zoom, use digital zoom for up to about 120x enlargement.



Move the zoom lever toward < □ 1 >.

- Hold the lever until zooming stops.
- Zooming stops at the largest possible zoom factor (before the image becomes noticeably grainy), which is then indicated on the screen.



2 Move the zoom lever toward <[♠]> again.

The camera zooms in even closer on the subject, using digital zoom.



- Moving the zoom lever will display the zoom bar (which indicates the zoom position). The color of the zoom bar will change depending on the zoom range.
 - White range: optical zoom range where the image will not appear grainy.
 - Yellow range: digital zoom range where the image is not noticeably grainy (ZoomPlus).
 - Blue range: digital zoom range where the image will appear grainy.
 - Because the blue range will not be available at some resolution settings (\square 68) the maximum zoom factor can be achieved by following step 1.
- Zoomed images may look grainy, under some resolution settings (\$\subseteq\$68) and zoom factors. In this case, the zoom factor is shown in blue.



Focal length when optical and digital zoom are combined is as follows (35mm film equivalent).

24 - 2880 mm (24 - 720 mm with optical zoom alone)

Reacquiring Subjects Lost After Zooming (Framing Assist – Seek)

If you lose track of a subject while zooming in, you can find it more easily by temporarily zooming out.





1 Look for the lost subject.

- Press and hold the < □ > button.
- ► The camera zooms out and displays a white frame around the area previously shown (before you pressed the <\□,'> button).



2 Reacquire the subject.

- Aim the camera so that the subject in the white frame, and then release the < □</p>

 button.
- The previous magnification is now restored, so that the area outlined in white fills the screen again.



- Some shooting information is not displayed while the camera is zoomed out.
- During movie shooting, the white frame is not displayed if you press the <i_T<> button. Also note that camera operating sounds such as zooming will be recorded.



- If you prefer to shoot at the zoom factor of the screen in step 1, press the shutter button all the way down.
- You can adjust the zoom factor that the camera will revert to after Zoom Framing Assist (when you release the <\□',> button) by moving the zoom lever as you hold the <\□',> button to resize the white frame.

For movies shot using the self-timer, [Delay] represents the delay before recording begins, but the [Shots] setting has no effect.



- When you specify multiple shots, image brightness and white balance are determined by the first shot. More time is required between shots when the flash fires or when you have specified to take many shots. Shooting will stop automatically when the memory card becomes full.
 - When a delay longer than two seconds is specified, two seconds before the shot, the lamp blinking and self-timer sound will speed up. (The lamp will remain lit in case the flash fires.)

Adding a Date Stamp

The camera can add the shooting date to images, in the lower-right corner. However, note that date stamps cannot be edited or removed, so confirm beforehand that the date and time are correct ($\square 22$).







- Press the <MENU> button, choose [Date Stamp] on the [at b, and then choose the desired option (47).

- Aim the camera so that [-] is on the desired subject, and then press the shutter button halfway.
- A blue frame is displayed, and the camera will keep the subject in focus and image brightness adjusted (Servo AF).

- Choosing a higher ISO speed will increase shutter speed, which may reduce subject blurriness and increase the flash range. However, shots may look grainy.



Correcting Image Brightness (i-Contrast)

Before shooting, excessively bright or dark image areas (such as faces or backgrounds) can be detected and automatically adjusted to the optimal brightness. Insufficient overall image contrast can also be automatically corrected before shooting to make subjects stand out better.



- Press the <MENU> button, choose [i-Contrast] on the [♠] tab, and then choose [Auto] (♠47).
- Once the setting is complete, [C₁] is displayed.



Under some shooting conditions, correction may be inaccurate or may cause images to appear grainy.



You can also correct existing images (Q150).



Face Detect

- Detects people's faces, and then sets the focus, exposure (evaluative metering only), and white balance ([AWB] only).

- When the camera detects movement, frames will follow moving subjects, within a certain range.
- After you press the shutter button halfway, up to nine green frames are displayed around faces in focus.

- If faces are not detected when Servo AF ((109) is set to [On], the AF frame is displayed in the center of the screen when you press the shutter button halfway.

- Subjects that are distant or extremely close

- Faces in profile, at an angle, or partly hidden
- The camera may misinterpret non-human subjects as faces.
- No AF frames are displayed if the camera cannot focus when you press the shutter button halfway.

This mode helps avoid missing shots of subjects in motion, because the camera continues to focus on the subject and adjust the exposure as long as you press the shutter button halfway.

You can change default camera operation of constantly focusing on subjects it is aimed at, even when the shutter button is not pressed. Instead. you can limit camera focusing to the moment you press the shutter button halfwav.

Helps avoid missing sudden photo opportunities, because the camera constantly focuses on subjects until you press the shutter button halfway.

Conserves battery power, because the Off camera does not focus constantly.

Adjusting the Flash Exposure Compensation

Just as with regular exposure compensation ($\square 93$), you can adjust the flash exposure from -2 to +2 stops, in 1/3-stop increments.



To avoid exposure problems in <Tv> and <Av> modes, you can have the camera automatically adjust the shutter speed or aperture value, even when standard exposure cannot otherwise be obtained. Press the <MENU> button and set [Safety Shift] on the [a] tab to [On] (\(\infty\)47).
However, safety shift is disabled when the flash fires.

- After you set the shutter speed or aperture value, the exposure level may change if you adjust the zoom or recompose the shot.
- Screen brightness may change depending on your specified shutter speed or aperture value. However, screen brightness remains the same when the flash is up and the mode is set to [4].
- To have the setting you did not configure in step 2 (whether shutter speed or aperture value) automatically adjusted to obtain standard exposure, hold the shutter button halfway and press the ⟨½⟩ button. Note that standard exposure may not be possible with some settings.



Checking the Focus

To check the focus of your shots, you can magnify the area of the image that was in the AF frame at the time of shooting.





1 Access Focus Check.

- Press the <DISP.> button (124).
- A white frame is displayed where the AF frame was when the focus was set.
- Gray frames are displayed over faces detected later, in Playback mode.
- The portion of the image in the orange frame is magnified.

Correcting Image Brightness (i-Contrast)

Excessively dark image areas (such as faces or backgrounds) can be detected and automatically adjusted to the optimal brightness. Insufficient overall image contrast is also automatically corrected, to make subjects stand out better. Choose from four correction levels, and then save the image as a separate file.

Press the <MENU> button, and then choose [i-Contrast] on the [▶] tab (△47).

Automatically corrects images affected by red-eye. You can save the corrected image as a separate file.



Formatting Memory Cards

Before using a new memory card or a card formatted in another device, you should format the card with this camera.

Formatting erases all data on a memory card. Before formatting, copy images on the memory card to a computer, or take other steps to back them up.

An Eye-Fi card (\square 193) contains software on the card itself. Before formatting an Eye-Fi card, install the software on a computer.





Access the [Format] screen.

- Choose [Format], and then press the <(iii) > button.
- 2 Choose [OK].
 - Press the <▲><▼> buttons to choose [Cancel], choose [OK] (either press the <◄><▶> buttons or turn the <◎> dial), and then press the <∰> button.
- Format the memory card.
 - To begin the formatting process, press the <A><▼> buttons or turn the <◎> dial to choose [OK], and then press the <®> button.
 - When formatting is finished, [Memory card formatting complete] is displayed.
 Press the <() > button.



Formatting or erasing data on a memory card only changes file management information on the card and does not erase the data completely. When transferring or disposing of memory cards, take steps to protect personal information if necessary, as by physically destroying cards.



The total card capacity indicated on the formatting screen may be less than the advertised capacity.

Low-Level Formatting

Perform low-level formatting in these cases: [Memory card error] is displayed, the camera is not working correctly, card image reading/writing is slower, continuous shooting is slower, or movie recording suddenly stops. Low-level formatting erases all data on a memory card. Before low-level formatting, copy images on the memory card to a computer, or take other steps to back them up.



Perform low-level formatting.

- On the screen in step 2 on ☐ 160, press the <A><▼> buttons or turn the <⑥> dial to choose [Low Level Format], and then select this option (mark with a [✓]) by pressing the <◄><▶> buttons.
- Follow steps 2 − 3 on □160 to continue with the formatting process.



- Low-level formatting takes longer than "Formatting Memory Cards" (\(\subseteq\) 160), because data is erased from all storage regions of the memory card.
- You can cancel low-level formatting in progress by choosing [Stop]. In this
 case, all data will be erased, but the memory card can be used normally.

File Numbering

Your shots are automatically numbered in sequential order (0001 – 9999) and saved in folders that store up to 2,000 images each. You can change how the camera assigns file numbers.



 Choose [File Numbering], and then choose an option.

Continuous	Images are numbered consecutively (until the 9999th shot is taken/saved) even if you switch memory cards.
Auto Reset	Image numbering is reset to 0001 if you switch memory cards, or when a new folder is created.



- Regardless of the option selected in this setting, shots may be numbered consecutively after the last number of existing images on newly inserted memory cards. To start saving shots from 0001, use an empty (or formatted (1160)) memory card.

Date-Based Image Storage

Instead of saving images in folders created each month, you can have the camera create folders each day you shoot to store shots taken that day.



- Choose [Create Folder], and then choose [Daily].
- Images will now be saved in folders created on the shooting date.



Lens Retraction Timing

The lens is normally retracted for safety about one minute after you press the $\langle \mathbf{L} \rangle$ button in Shooting mode (\square 42). To have the lens retracted immediately after you press the $\langle \mathbf{L} \rangle$ button, set the retraction timing to [0 sec.].



Choose [Lens Retract], and then choose [0 sec.].



Power-Saving Adjustment

Adjust the timing of automatic camera and screen deactivation (Auto Power Down and Display Off, respectively) as needed (42).



- Access the [Power Saving] screen.
 - Choose [Power Saving], and then press the <()) button.
- Configure the settings.
 - After choosing an item, press the<♦>< b> buttons to adjust it as needed.



To conserve battery power, you should normally choose [On] for [Auto Power Down] and [1 min.] or less for [Display Off].

World Clock

To ensure that your shots will have the correct local date and time when you travel abroad, simply register the destination in advance and switch to that time zone. This convenient feature eliminates the need to change the Date/ Time setting manually.





Tips on Using Included Accessories



Charge the battery on (or immediately before) the day of use

Charged batteries gradually lose their charge, even when they are not used.

You can easily check the charge state of the battery by attaching the cover so that ▲ is visible on a charged battery, and attaching it so that ▲ is not visible on an uncharged battery.



Long-term battery storage

After using up all remaining battery power, remove the battery from the camera. Store the battery with the cover attached. Storing a partially charged battery over extended periods (about a year) may shorten its life or affect performance.



Using an Eye-Fi Card

Before using an Eye-Fi card, always confirm that local use is permitted (23).

Inserting a prepared Eye-Fi card enables automatic wireless transfer of images to a computer or uploading to a photo-sharing website. Images are transferred by the Eye-Fi card. Refer to the card's user manual or contact the manufacturer for instructions on preparing and using cards or resolving transfer problems.



- When using an Eye-Fi card, keep the following points in mind.

 - When troubleshooting image transfer issues, check the card and computer settings. For details, refer to the card's user manual.
 - Poor Eye-Fi connections may cause image transfer to take a long time, and transfer may be interrupted in some cases.
 - Eye-Fi cards may become hot, due to their transfer functions.
 - Battery power will be consumed faster than in normal use.
 - Camera operation may become sluggish. To resolve this, try setting [Eye-Fi trans.] to [Disable].

Connection status of Eye-Fi cards in the camera can be checked on the shooting screen (in regular information display mode) or playback screen (in simple information display mode).

Appendix

Helpful information when using the camera

Troubleshooting

If you think there is a problem with the camera, first check the following. If the items below do not solve your problem, contact a Canon Customer Support Help Desk.

Power

Nothing happens when the ON/OFF button is pressed.

- Confirm that the battery is charged (119).
- Confirm that the battery is inserted facing the correct way (\$\sum_20\$).
- Confirm that the memory card/battery cover is fully closed (Q21).
- Dirty battery terminals reduce battery performance. Try cleaning the terminals with a cotton swab and reinserting the battery a few times.

The battery is depleted quickly.

- Battery performance decreases at low temperatures. Try warming the battery a little by putting it in your pocket, for example, with the terminal cover on.
- If these measures do not help and the battery is still depleted soon after charging, it has reached the end of its life. Purchase a new battery.

The lens is not retracted.

 Do not open the memory card/battery cover while the camera is on. Close the cover, turn the camera on, and then turn it off again ((21)).

The battery is swollen.

 Battery swelling is normal and does not pose any safety concerns. However, if battery swelling prevents the battery from fitting in the camera, contact a Canon Customer Support Help Desk.

Display on a TV

Camera images look distorted or not displayed on a TV (176).

Shooting

Cannot shoot.

In Playback mode (Q25), press the shutter button halfway (Q43).

Strange display on the screen under low light (245).

Strange display on the screen when shooting.

Note that the following display problems are not recorded in still images but are recorded in movies.

- The screen may darken under bright light.
- The screen may flicker under fluorescent or LED lighting.
- Purplish banding may appear on the screen if you compose a shot that includes a bright light source.

No date stamp is added to images.

- Configure the [Date Stamp] setting (\$\sum_6\$65). Note that date stamps are not added
 to images automatically, merely because you have configured the [Date/Time] setting
 (\$\sum_2\$2).
- Date stamps are not added in shooting modes (\$\sum_212\$) in which this setting cannot be configured (\$\sum_65\$).

[4] flashes on the screen when the shutter button is pressed, and shooting is not possible (55).

[9] is displayed when the shutter button is pressed halfway.

- Raise the flash and set the flash mode to [\$] (111).
- Increase the ISO speed (\$\sum_96\$).
- Mount the camera on a tripod or take other measures to keep it still. In this case, you should set [IS Mode] to [Off] (114).

Shots are out of focus.

- Press the shutter button halfway to focus on subjects before pressing it all the way down to shoot (\(\infty\)43).
- Make sure subjects are within focusing range (Q217).
- Set [AF-assist Beam] to [On] (
 —75).
- Confirm that unneeded functions such as macro are deactivated.
- Try shooting with focus lock or AF lock (Qq 106, 110).

No AF frames are displayed and the camera does not focus when the shutter button is pressed halfway.

To have AF frames displayed and the camera focus correctly, try composing the shot with higher-contrast subject areas centered before you press the shutter button halfway. Otherwise, try pressing the shutter button halfway repeatedly.

Subjects in shots look too dark.

- Raise the flash and set the flash mode to [\$] (\(\sum_111\)).
- Adjust brightness by using exposure compensation (Q93).
- Adjust contrast by using i-Contrast (Q97, 150).
- Use AE lock or spot metering (Q 94, 95).

Subjects look too bright, highlights are washed-out.

- Lower the flash and set the flash mode to [3] (
 (27).
- Use AE lock or spot metering (Q 94, 95).
- Reduce the lighting on subjects.

Shots look too dark despite the flash firing (\$\infty\$55).

- Shoot within flash range (217).
- Adjust brightness by using flash exposure compensation or changing the flash output level (
 112).
- Increase the ISO speed (\$\sum_96\$).

Subjects in flash shots look too bright, highlights are washed-out.

- Shoot within flash range (217).
- Lower the flash and set the flash mode to [3] (27).
- Adjust brightness by using flash exposure compensation or changing the flash output level (
 112).

White dots or similar image artifacts appear in flash shots.

This is caused by light from the flash reflecting off dust or airborne particles.

Shots look grainy.

Lower the ISO speed (QQ96).

Subjects are affected by red-eye (QQ69).

- Edit images using red-eye correction (Q 151).

Recording to the memory card takes too long, or continuous shooting is slower.

• Use the camera to perform low-level formatting of the memory card (Q161).

Shooting settings or FUNC. menu settings are not available.

 Available setting items vary by shooting mode. Refer to "Functions Available in Each Shooting Mode", "FUNC. Menu", and "Shooting Menu" (206 – 213).

Shooting Movies

The elapsed time shown is incorrect, or recording is interrupted.

 Use the camera to format the memory card, or switch to a card that supports highspeed recording. Note that even if the elapsed time display is incorrect, the length of movies on the memory card corresponds to the actual recording time (\(\subseteq\) 160).

[1] is displayed and shooting stops automatically.

The camera's internal memory buffer filled up as the camera could not record to the memory card quickly enough. Try one of the following measures.

- Use the camera to perform low-level formatting of the memory card (QQ161).
- Lower the image quality (\$\sum_70\$).
- Switch to a memory card that supports high-speed recording (Q217).

Zooming is not possible.

Playback

Playback is not possible.

 Image or movie playback may not be possible if a computer is used to rename files or alter the folder structure. Refer to the Software Guide (Q31) for details on folder structure and file names.

Playback stops, or audio skips.

- Switch to a memory card that you have performed low-level formatting on with the camera (Q161).
- There may be brief interruptions when playing movies copied to memory cards that have slow read speeds.
- When movies are played on a computer, frames may be dropped and audio may skip if computer performance is inadequate.

Sound is not played during movies.

- Adjust the volume (\$\iiii 30\$, 123) if you have activated [Mute] (\$\iiii 156\$) or the sound in the movie is faint.
- No sound is played for movies shot in [4] (\$\lime{4}\$] (\$\lime{1}\$83) mode because audio is not recorded in this mode.

Memory Card

The memory card is not recognized.

Restart the camera, with the memory card in it (Q20).

Computer

Cannot transfer images to a computer.

When attempting to transfer images to the computer via a cable, try reducing the transfer speed as follows.

Press the <►> button to enter Playback mode. Hold the <MENU> button down as you press the <▲> and <⊕> buttons at the same time. On the next screen, press the <◄><>> buttons to choose [B], and then press the <⊕> button.

Eye-Fi Cards

Cannot transfer images (Q193).

✓ On-Screen Messages

If an error message is displayed, respond as follows.

No memory card

 The memory card may be inserted facing the wrong way. Reinsert the memory card facing the correct way (\$\subseteq 21\$).

Memory card locked

The write-protect tab of the memory card is set to the locked position. Switch the write-protect tab to the unlocked position ($\square 20$).

Cannot record!

 Shooting was attempted without a memory card in the camera. To shoot, insert a memory card facing the correct way (\$\subseteq 21\$).

Memory card error (Q161)

 If the same error message is displayed even when you have inserted a formatted memory card facing the correct way, contact a Canon Customer Support Help Desk (21).

Insufficient space on card

There is not enough free space on the memory card to shoot (\$\instyle{1}\$51, 77, 91, 115) or edit images (\$\instyle{1}\$146 – 151). Either erase unneeded images (\$\instyle{1}\$136, 137) or insert a memory card with enough free space (\$\instyle{1}\$20).

Charge the battery (20)

No Image.

• The memory card does not contain any images that can be displayed.

Protected! (Q 132)

Unidentified Image/Incompatible JPEG/Image too large./Cannot play back AVI/RAW

- Unsupported or corrupt images cannot be displayed.
- It may not be possible to display images that were edited or renamed on a computer, or images shot with another camera.

Cannot magnify!/Cannot play back this content in Smart Shuffle/Cannot rotate/Cannot modify image/Cannot register this image!/Cannot modify/Cannot assign to category/Unselectable image.

The following functions may be unavailable for images that were renamed or already edited on a computer, or images shot with another camera. Note that starred (*) functions are not available for movies.

Magnify* (1129), Smart Shuffle* (1131), Categorize (1143), Rotate (1140), Edit* (1146 – 151), Assign as Start-up Image* (1159), Print List* (1186), and Photobook Set-up* (1190).

Invalid selection range

When specifying a range for image selection (\$\sum 134\$, 138, 145, 188), you attempted to choose an initial image that was after the final image, or vice-versa.

Exceeded selection limit

- More than 998 images were selected for Print List (☐186) or Photobook Set-up (☐190). Choose 998 images or less.
- Print List (☐186) or Photobook Set-up (☐190) settings could not be saved correctly. Reduce the number of selected images and try again.
- You attempted to choose more than 500 images in Protect (\$\infty\$132), Erase (\$\infty\$136), Favorites (\$\infty\$142), My Category (\$\infty\$143), Print List (\$\infty\$186), or Photobook Set-up (\$\infty\$190).

Communication error

 An excessive amount of images (approx. 1,000) on the memory card prevented printing or image transfer to a computer. To transfer the images, use a commercially available USB card reader. To print, insert the memory card directly into the printer card slot.

Naming error!

The folder could not be created or images could not be recorded, because the highest supported folder number (999) for storing images on the card has been reached and the highest supported image number (9999) for images in folders has been reached. In the [↑↑] menu, change [File Numbering] to [Auto Reset] (□162), or format the memory card (□160).

Lens Error

- This error may occur if the lens is held while it is moving, or when the camera is used in dusty or sandy locations.
- Frequent display of this error message may indicate camera damage. In this case, contact a Canon Customer Support Help Desk.

A camera error was detected (error number)

- If this error message is displayed immediately after a shot, the image may not have been saved. Switch to Playback mode to check for the image.
- Frequent display of this error message may indicate camera damage. In this case, write down the error number (Exx) and contact a Canon Customer Support Help Desk.

File Error

Correct printing (\$\infty\$179) may not be possible for photos from other cameras or images that have been altered using computer software, even if the camera is connected to the printer.

Print error


