# Highlights of the XF305/XF300

The Canon XF305/XF300 HD Camcorder has been designed to fulfill the needs demanded by industry professionals. The following are just some of the many features that will help turn your creative vision into reality.

## **HD** Recording

3CMOS system and DIGIC DV III image processor The camcorder is equipped with three 1/3-type CMOS sensors that each capture video at an effective pixel count of approximately 2.07 megapixels (1920x1080). Combined with the DIGIC DV III image processor and newly developed 18x zoom lens (29.3 mm, F1.6), the camcorder offers a center resolution of 1,000 TV lines. Furthermore, the camcorder produces spectacular video with true-to-life color reproduction while reducing noise and "rolling shutter" artifacts thanks to a twofold improvement (when the frame rate is 50i) over previous models in scanning speed.

## Superb HD video

The camcorder uses the MPEG-2 Long GOP codec. When you record using the 50 Mbps bit rate (with 4:2:2 color sampling), the quality of your recordings will rival that of broadcast video. Your recordings are saved as Material eXchange Format (MXF) files, which are compatible with major non-linear editing (NLE) software.

You can configure the video recording signal to suit your needs. By combining the bit rate/resolution setting with the frame rate setting, you can produce video from 1440x1080/25P at 25 Mbps to 1280x720/50P at 35 Mbps to 1920x1080/50i at 50 Mbps. You can select from a total of 11 different combinations!

#### Operability

## Focus and zoom

Enhancements were made to the focus and zoom systems. The newly added full manual focus mode ( $\bigcirc$  53) sets physical stops on the focus ring and also displays a distance indicator on the ring itself. With the physical stops on the zoom ring ( $\bigcirc$  76), you can easily go from full wide angle to full telephoto by turning the zoom ring about 90°.

#### Overall design

The various buttons, switches and other controls were redesigned after extensive research and interviews with industry professionals. Buttons and switches were repositioned for easier use and access and the ergonomic design of the grip was also refined for better balance. In addition, you can frame your shots more easily with the improved viewfinder and larger LCD screen, which both now have 100% coverage.

#### Recording media

The camcorder records video and audio to CompactFlash (CF) cards. You can even make lengthy recordings without worry because the camcorder features two CF card slots. When one CF card becomes full, the recording will automatically continue on the other one without interruption when you use relay recording (\( \supersquare{1} \) 41). In addition, using double slot recording (\( \supersquare{1} \) 42) lets you record the same clip simultaneously to both CF cards.

## Canon XF Utility software

Managing your recordings is as simple as using the **Canon XF Utility** software. You can transfer your recordings to your computer, where you can view and manage them. Using the associated plugins, you can then use the recordings with major NLE software\*.

# Versatile Artistic Expression

## Special recording modes

The special recording modes ( $\square$  104) give you more creative control over your recordings. You can create a slow motion or fast motion effect in your recordings, record a certain number of frames at a set interval (ideal for subjects with little movement) or record a certain number of frames every time you press a button (ideal for stop motion animation).

## Custom picture settings

With custom picture settings ( 117), you can enjoy unparalleled image control to deliver the "look" you want by adjusting parameters, such as gamma and sharpness. The custom picture settings can be recorded onto an SD card, which allows multiple XF305/XF300 camcorders to use the same settings, or embedded in the recording itself.

## Advanced Professional Features

Pro-level connectivity (XF305 only)

An industry-standard HD/SD SDI terminal (☐ 152) for uncompressed HD signal output, embedded audio and SMPTE time code (LTC) give the camcorder the functionality of professional broadcast cameras. Genlock synchronization (☐ 89) and the TIME CODE terminal (☐ 89) allow the camcorder to be part of any multi-camera shooting setup.

#### Customization

The camcorder features several customization options. You can assign often-used functions to assignable buttons ( $\square$  115) so that you can call up those functions with the press of a single button. Custom functions ( $\square$  129) and custom onscreen displays ( $\square$  130) give you even more freedom to control many aspects of the camcorder's operation. Save custom picture and menu settings to an SD card so that you can transfer your setting preferences to other XF305/XF300 camcorders in order to use them in the same way.

#### Other Functions

#### Audio

Sound is recorded as 2-channel linear PCM audio (16-bit/48 kHz). You can use the built-in microphone or the two XLR audio input terminals (with phantom power supply) when recording.

## Video scopes

Check the brightness of the image using the waveform monitor ( $\bigcirc$  99), the color of the image using the vectorscope ( $\bigcirc$  100), or the focus using the edge monitor ( $\bigcirc$  100).

#### Added and improved functionality

Other functions include improved image stabilization ( $\bigcirc$  61); the option to add metadata ( $\bigcirc$  97), and, using the optional GP-E2 GPS Receiver, also GPS information ( $\bigcirc$  112) to recordings; and the Intelligent System-compatible battery pack ( $\bigcirc$  199). Also, optical axis shift ( $\bigcirc$  110) and the focal length guide ( $\bigcirc$  111) have been added to aid in 3D shooting.


## Conventions Used in this Manual

- The following terms are used in this manual.
  - "Screen" refers to the LCD screen and the viewfinder screen.
  - "CF card" refers to a CompactFlash (CF) card.
  - "SD card" refers to an SD or SDHC memory card.
  - "Recording media" refers to CF cards and SD cards.
- Photographs in the manual are simulated pictures taken with a still camera. Some screenshots have been altered to make them easier to read.
- Illustrations in the manual show the **XF305**.

When a function requires the use of the menu, the quick reference shows the submenus and, when applicable, the default setting for the menu item. The example illustration indicates that you can find the function by selecting the [IMM Camera Setup] menu and then the [Image Stabilizer] menu item.

## Operating modes



# **Preparing the Power Supply**

Preparations

You can power the camcorder using a battery pack or directly using the AC adapter. If you connect the AC adapter to the camcorder while a battery pack is attached, the camcorder will draw power from the power outlet.

Charge battery packs before use. For approximate charging times and recording/playback times with a fully charged battery pack, refer to Charging Times ( 199) and Recording and Playback Times ( 199).

# Using a Battery Pack

You can power the camcorder using the supplied BP-955 or optional BP-975, BP-950G or BP-970G Battery Pack. The BP-955 and BP-975 Battery Packs are compatible with Intelligent System, meaning that you can check the remaining battery time.

# Charging the Battery Pack


Charge battery packs using the supplied AC adapter. Before using a battery pack, remove the terminal cover in advance.

- 1 If the supplied AC adapter is connected to the camcorder, disconnect the DC plug from the camcorder's DC IN terminal.
- 2 Connect the power cord to the AC adapter (1).
- 3 Plug the power cord into a power outlet (2).
- 4 Attach the battery pack to the AC adapter (3).
  - Press lightly and slide the battery pack in the direction of the arrow until it clicks.
  - The CHARGE indicator starts flashing and also indicates the battery pack's approximate charge. The indicator will stay on when charging has completed.



0-34%: Flashes once per second 35-69%: Flashes twice per second 70-99%: Flashes 3 times per second

5 When charging has completed, remove the battery pack from the AC adapter.




6 Unplug the power cord from the power outlet and disconnect it from the AC adapter.



- To charge the battery pack, disconnect the AC adapter from the camcorder.
- The supplied BP-955 and optional BP-975 Battery Packs are not compatible with previous Canon camcorder models.


## Attaching the Battery Pack

- 1 Set the **POWER** switch to OFF (1).
- 2 Slide the BATT. OPEN (open battery compartment) switch in the direction of the arrow and open the battery compartment cover (2).
- 3 Insert the battery pack all the way into the compartment and press gently until it clicks (3).
- 4 Close the battery compartment cover.



#### Removing the Battery Pack


- 1 Set the **POWER** switch to OFF.
- 2 Slide the BATT. OPEN switch in the direction of the arrow and open the battery compartment cover.
- 3 Press the BATT. RELEASE (battery release) latch in the direction of the arrow and pull out the battery.
- 4 Close the battery compartment cover.



#### Checking the Remaining Battery Charge

If you are using the supplied BP-955 or optional BP-975 Battery Pack, you can check the approximate remaining battery charge using one of the following methods when the camcorder is turned off. When the camcorder is turned on, you can check on the remaining battery charge by looking at any recording/playback screen or the [Battery / Hour Meter] status screen ( $\square$  179).

Press the CHECK button on the battery pack. An indicator will light for approximately 3 seconds and show the approximate remaining battery charge.


When the camcorder is off and an Intelligent System-compatible battery pack is attached, press the BATT. INFO (battery information) button to display the remaining battery time and available recording time (displays for 5 seconds). 


# (i) NOTES

- We recommend charging the battery pack in temperatures between 10 °C and 30 °C. Outside the temperature range of 0 °C to 40 °C, charging will not start.
- If there is a malfunction with the AC adapter or battery pack, the charge indicator will go out and charging will stop.
- For handling precautions regarding the battery pack, refer to Battery Pack (11 193).
- Charged battery packs continue to discharge naturally. Therefore, charge them on the day of use, or the day before, to ensure a full charge.
- We recommend that you prepare battery packs to last 2 to 3 times longer than you think you might need.
- The first time you use a battery pack, fully charge it and then use the camcorder until the battery pack is completely exhausted. Doing so will ensure that the remaining recording time will be displayed accurately.
- Repeatedly charging and discharging the battery pack will eventually shorten its battery life. When you are using the supplied BP-955 or optional BP-975 Battery Pack, you can check the battery life on the [Battery / Hour Meter] status screen ( 183) or the battery information screen (press the BATT INFO. button while the camcorder is turned off). Fully charging the battery pack and then discharging it will give you a more accurate reading.









## Using a Power Outlet

When Using the Supplied CA-935 AC Adapter:

- 1 Set the **POWER** switch to OFF (1).
- 2 If a battery pack is attached to the AC adapter, remove it.
  - Connecting the AC adapter to the camcorder while a battery pack is attached to the AC adapter may result in the camcorder not operating correctly.
- 3 Connect the AC adapter's DC plug to the DC IN terminal on the camcorder (2).
- 4 Connect the power cord to the AC adapter and plug it into a power outlet (③).



 Turn off the camcorder before connecting or disconnecting the AC adapter.

# (i) NOTES

 When using the camcorder with a power outlet, you can change the battery pack while the power is on.

When Using the Optional CA-920 Compact Power Adapter and DC-920 DC Coupler:

- 1 Set the **POWER** switch to OFF (1).
- 2 Attach the DC coupler to the camcorder (2).
- 3 Connect the power cord to the compact power adapter and plug it into a power outlet (③).
- 4 Connect the DC coupler to the adapter (4).
- 5 Close the battery compartment cover.
- 6 Detach the DC coupler after use.
  - Open the battery compartment cover, push the BATT. RELEASE latch left and pull out the DC coupler.



 Turn off the camcorder before connecting or disconnecting the AC adapter.

# Turning the Camcorder On and Off

The camcorder has two operating modes: CAMERA (CAMERA) mode for making recordings and MEDIA (MEDIA) mode for playing back recordings. Select the operating mode using the POWER switch.

#### To turn on the camcorder

Hold down the button on the **POWER** switch and move it to CAMERA for CAMERA mode or MEDIA for MEDIA mode.

# Date, Time and Language Settings

# Setting the Date and Time

You will need to set the date and time of the camcorder before you can start using it. When the camcorder's clock is not set, the [Date/Time] screen will appear automatically with the day selected.

**MEDIA** 

Operating modes: CAMERA



- 1 Push the joystick up/down or turn the SELECT dial to change the day then move (▶) to the month.
- 2 Change the rest of the fields in the same way.
- 3 Select (►) [Set] and then press SET to start the clock and close the screen.

# (i) NOTES

- When the built-in rechargeable lithium battery is exhausted, the date and time setting may be lost. In such case, recharge the built-in lithium battery (
  195) and set the time zone, date and time again.



## Changing the Time Zone

Change the time zone to match the time zone of your location. The default setting is [UTC+01:00 Central Europe]. The time zones are based on Coordinated Universal Time (UTC).

Operating modes: CAMERA MEDIA

- 1 Press the MENU button.
- 2 Push the joystick up/down or turn the SELECT dial to select [ Other Functions].
- 3 Select [Time Zone] in a similar fashion.

# Date, Time and Language Settings

- 4 Push the joystick up/down or turn the SELECT dial to change the time zone.
- 5 Press SET to set the time zone and then press the MENU button to close the menu.

# Displaying the Date and Time while Recording

You can display the date and time in the lower left of the screen.

Operating modes: CAMERA MEDIA


- 1 Press the MENU button.
- 2 Push the joystick up/down or turn the SELECT dial to select [ LCD/VF Setup].
- 3 Select [Custom Display] and then [Date/Time] in a similar fashion.
- 4 Push the joystick up/down or turn the SELECT dial to select the information to display.
  - Select [Off] to record without displaying the date and time.
- 5 Press SET and then press the MENU button to close the menu.


## Changing the Language

The default language is English but you can select German, Spanish, French, Italian, Polish, Russian, Simplified Chinese, Korean or Japanese. However, the status screens, custom picture menus and some other menu options will always be displayed in English, regardless of the language setting.

Operating modes: CAMERA MEDIA

- 1 Press the MENU button.
- 2 Push the joystick up/down or turn the SELECT dial to select [✔ Other Functions].
- 3 Select [Language 🗐] in a similar fashion.
- 4 Push the joystick up/down or turn the SELECT dial to select a language.
- 5 Press SET to select the language and then press the MENU button to close the menu.






# **Using the Menus**

In CAMERA mode, many of the camcorder's functions can be adjusted from the menu for general settings, which opens after pressing the MENU button. In MEDIA mode, press the MENU button to open the menu for general settings or SET to open the clip menu for clip operations. For details about the available menu options and settings, refer to Menu Options (11) 169).

## Selecting an Option from the Menu

The following is a step-by-step explanation of how to select an option from the menu. In the procedures throughout the rest of this manual, opening and closing the menu is assumed and not included in the procedure.


#### 1 Press the MENU button.

- The menu opens with the orange selection frame indicating the menu item that was selected the previous time the menu was closed (unless the camcorder was turned off).
- 2 Push the joystick up/down or turn the SELECT dial to select the desired submenu.
- 3 Push the joystick right or press SET.
  - The orange selection frame will appear on a menu item in the submenu.
  - Press the CANCEL button, push the joystick left, or select [5] to return to the previous submenu.

# Using the Menus

- 4 Push the joystick up/down or turn the SELECT dial to select the desired menu item.
  - If a submenu contains many menu items, a scroll bar will appear on the right side of the submenu indicating that you must scroll up or down to see other menu items.
  - A ► mark next to a menu item indicates another submenu. Repeat steps 3 and 4.
- 5 Push the joystick right or press SET.
  - The orange selection frame will appear on a setting option.
  - Press the CANCEL button to return to the previous submenu.
- 6 Push the joystick up/down or turn the SELECT dial to select the desired setting option and then press SET.
  - Depending on the menu item, additional selections may be necessary.
- 7 Press the MENU button to close the menu.
- (i) NOTES
- Unavailable items may appear grayed out.
- Pressing the MENU button at any time closes the menu.
- When using the wireless controller, use the △, ♥, ⋖, ▷ and SET buttons in the same way as the camcorder's joystick.
- You can check the current settings on the status screens (\$\sum 179\$).


This section outlines the basic preparations for the camcorder such as attaching the lens hood, attaching/removing the eye cup, and adjusting the viewfinder and LCD screen.




# Attaching the Lens Hood

Attach the lens hood to protect the lens and reduce the amount of stray light that may hit the lens.

- 1 Place the lens hood on the front of the lens so that the window for the external Instant AF sensor faces down (1) and turn it 90 degrees clockwise (2).
  - Be careful not to deform the lens hood.
  - Make sure that the lens hood is aligned with the thread.
- 2 Tighten the lock screw (3).



# Attaching and Detaching the Eye Cup




## Attaching the Eye Cup

Attach the eye cup so that it covers the rubber portion of the viewfinder unit.

- The dioptric adjustment lever can be operated even with the eye cup attached.
- For left eye use, attach the eye cup so that the protruding portion faces the opposite side.


# Detaching the Eye Cup

Detach the eye cup as shown in the illustration.






Turn on the camcorder and adjust the dioptric adjustment lever.



# Attaching the Viewfinder Cap

Pointing the viewfinder lens at the sun or other strong light sources may cause damage to internal components. When you are not using the viewfinder, make sure to attach the viewfinder cap to the viewfinder. This will also protect the viewfinder from scratches and dirt. Attach the viewfinder cap by inserting it into the rubber portion of the viewfinder unit.





## Using the LCD Panel

You can slide out the LCD panel to the left or right based on your preference and shooting situation.

- 1 Slide out the LCD panel.
  - To slide out the LCD panel to the left, push on the right side of the LCD panel. To slide out the LCD panel to the right, push on the left side.
- 2 Extend the LCD panel out until it is perpendicular to the handle ((1)).
- 3 Rotate the LCD panel and adjust it to the desired position (2).
- (i) NOTES
- About the LCD and viewfinder screens: The screens are produced using extremely high-precision manufacturing techniques, with more than 99.99% of the pixels operating to specification. Less than 0.01% of the pixels may occasionally misfire or appear as black, red, blue or green dots. This has no effect on the recorded image and does not constitute a malfunction.
- By default, the viewfinder screen is turned off while you use the LCD screen. However, you can also use both displays simultaneously. See the following section.
- You can set the LCD screen to black & white (\$\sum 33\$).
- When you use a commercially available lens adapter and the image on the screen is inverted, you can use the [♠ Other Functions] ② [Custom Function] ② [Scan Reverse Rec] setting to return the image to the correct orientation.

# Using the Viewfinder and LCD Screen Simultaneously

By default, the viewfinder screen is turned off while you use the LCD screen. Follow the procedure below to use both of them simultaneously.

Operating modes: CAMERA MEDIA

- 1 Open the [LCD/VF Simul.] submenu. [☑ LCD/VF Setup] ◎ [LCD/VF Simul.]
- 2 Select [On] and then press SET.
- (i) NOTES
- When you record while the LCD panel is turned toward the subject, you
  can press the MIRROR button to invert the image on the screen
  vertically.

# Adjusting the Viewfinder/LCD Screen

You can adjust the brightness, contrast, color, sharpness, and backlight of the viewfinder and LCD screen independently of each other. These adjustments will not affect your recordings.

Operating modes: CAMERA MEDIA

- 1 Open the setup menu for the viewfinder or LCD screen.
- [ LCD/VF Setup] [LCD Setup] or [VF Setup]
- 2 Select [Brightness], [Contrast], [Color], [Sharpness] or [Backlight] and then press SET.
- 3 Adjust the setting and then press SET.
  - Repeat steps 2 and 3 to adjust other settings as necessary.

**NOTES** 

 If you set an assignable button to [LCD Setup] ( 115), you can press the button to open the [LCD Setup] submenu.

# Setting the Screen to Black & White

The viewfinder and LCD screen display in color by default but you can set them to black & white. Even when the screen is black & white, onscreen text and icons will still be displayed in color.

Operating modes: CAMERA MEDIA

- 1 Open the [LCD/VF B&W] submenu.
  - [ LCD/VF Setup] [LCD/VF B&W]
- 2 Select [On] and then press SET.






# Adjusting the Grip Belt

Adjust the grip belt so that you can reach the grip zoom rocker with your index and middle fingers, and the START/STOP button with your thumb.

# Attaching a Shoulder Strap

Pass the ends through the strap mount and adjust the length of the strap.



**IMPORTANT** 

• Be careful not to drop the camcorder when attaching or adjusting the shoulder strap.

# Removing and Attaching the Terminal Covers

Remove the covers for the following terminals in order to access them.

- HD/SD SDI terminal\*
- GENLOCK and TIME CODE terminals\*
- VIDEO 2 terminal
- $\bigcap$  (headphone) and REMOTE terminals
- HD/SD COMPONENT OUT terminal
- AV terminal
- USB and HDMI OUT terminals

\* **XF305** only.

## Removing the Terminal Covers

- 1 Open the terminal cover and pull it out.
- 2 Grasp the strip connecting the terminal cover to the camcorder and pull.

This step is not necessary for the covers for the HD/SD SDI, GENLOCK, TIME CODE and VIDEO 2 terminals.

## Attaching the Terminal Covers

Insert the connecting strip into the opening to attach the terminal cover.



 If the connecting strip is difficult to grasp, use a pair of tweezers or similar tool.



# **Using the Wireless Controller**

## Inserting the Battery


Insert the supplied CR2025 lithium button battery into the wireless controller before use.

- 1 Press the tab in the direction of the arrow (1) and pull out the battery holder (2).
- 2 Place the lithium button battery with the + side facing up (3).
- 3 Insert the battery holder (4).

#### Activating the Wireless Controller

Operating modes: CAMERA MEDIA

- 1 Open the [Wireless Controller] submenu.
  - [ Other Functions] [ Wireless Controller]
- 2 Select [On] and then press SET.

## Using the Wireless Controller to Operate the Camcorder

When using the wireless controller, point it at the camcorder's remote sensor. When the wireless controller's buttons are operated, the camcorder's tally lamps will illuminate.



- When you use the START/STOP button or ZOOM buttons on the wireless controller, you must press the record enable button simultaneously with the desired button.
- When the camcorder cannot be operated with the wireless controller, or when it can only be operated at very close range, replace the battery.
- The wireless controller may not work properly when the remote sensor is located under strong light sources or direct sunlight.


# Using a Tripod


You can mount the camcorder on a tripod but do not use tripods with mounting screws longer than 5.5 mm as this may cause damage to the camcorder.

## Using a Tripod with 0.95 cm (3/8") Mounting Screws

To use a tripod with 0.95 cm (3/8") mounting screws, first attach the optional TB-1 Tripod Adapter Base to the camcorder and then attach the tripod to the adapter base.

- 1 Remove the tripod base from the camcorder.
  - Remove the 4 screws and then remove the base.
- 2 Attach the optional TB-1 Tripod Adapter Base.
  - Firmly screw in the 4 screws.
- 3 Attach the tripod.
  - Firmly screw in the tripod screw.
  - If a tripod has both a 0.64 cm (1/4") screw and 0.95 cm (3/8") mounting screw, firmly screw in both.





The camcorder records clips to CompactFlash (CF) cards and photos\* to SD and SS SDHC memory cards. The camcorder is equipped with two CF card slots. Initialize recording media ( 40) when you use them with this camcorder for the first time.

\* The camcorder can record custom picture settings and camera settings on to an SD card. To record a user memo with a clip, use the Canon XF Utility software (156) to a create user memo file and save it to the SD card. The camcorder can read the file and embed it in the clip.

#### Compatible CF cards

You can use UDMA-compatible\* Type I CF cards with a capacity of at least 512 MB with the camcorder. For more details, visit your local Canon Web site.

\* The Ultra Direct Memory Access (UDMA) specification allows data to be transferred between the CF card and device at high transfer speeds (measured in MBps). Depending on the CF card, you may not be able to record even when using a UDMA-compatible CF card.



### IMPORTANT

- About high capacity CF cards You can use CF cards with a capacity of 128 GB or larger with this camcorder but such CF cards are initialized using the exFAT file system.
  - When using exFAT-formatted CF cards with other devices (digital recorders, card readers, etc.), make sure that the external device is compatible with exFAT. For more information on compatibility, contact the computer, operating system or memory card manufacturer.
  - If you use exFAT-formatted CF cards with a computer OS that is not exFAT-compatible, you may be prompted to format the CF card. In such case, cancel the operation to prevent data loss.





### Inserting a CF Card

You can insert a CF card into CF card slot A or slot B. If you have two CF cards, you can use both slots.

- 1 Slide the CF card slot cover switch in the direction of the ◀ mark (1).
  - The CF card slot cover will open upward (slot A) or downward (slot B).






- 2 Insert the CF card straight, with the label facing up, all the way into the slot (2).
- 3 Close the CF card slot cover (3).
  - Do not force the cover closed if the CF card is not correctly inserted.



### Checking the Status of the CF Card Slots

You can check the status of the CF card slots immediately by looking at the CF  $\blacksquare$ /CF  $\blacksquare$  access indicator. Refer to the following table.

### Removing a CF card

- 1 Wait until the access indicator for the card slot with the CF card to be removed is off.
- 2 Slide the CF card slot cover switch in the direction of the ■ mark (②).
  - The CF card slot cover will open upward (slot A) or downward (slot B).

- 3 Push the CF card release button (3).
  - The release button partially pops out.
- 4 Push in the CF card release button to release the CF card (4).
- 5 Pull the CF card all the way out and close the CF card slot cover.



- Observe the following precautions while the CFA or CFB access indicator is illuminated in red. Failure to do so may result in permanent data loss.
  - Do not disconnect the power source or turn off the camcorder.
  - Do not open the cover of the CF card slot being accessed.


### Inserting and Removing an SD Card


- 1 Turn off the camcorder (1).
- 2 Open the SD card slot cover.
- 3 Insert the SD card straight, with the label facing the grip belt, all the way into the SD card slot until it clicks ((2)).
- 4 Close the SD card slot cover (3).
  - Do not force the cover closed if the SD card is not correctly inserted.

# ♠ IMPORTANT

- Observe the following precautions while the SD card access indicator is flashing. Failure to do so may result in permanent data loss.
  - Do not disconnect the power source or turn off the camcorder.
  - Do not remove the SD card.
- Turn off the camcorder before inserting or removing an SD card.
   Inserting or removing the SD card with the camcorder on may result in permanent data loss.
- SD cards have front and back sides that are not interchangeable.
   Inserting an SD card facing the wrong direction can cause a malfunction of the camcorder. Be sure to insert the SD card as described in step 3.

- To remove the SD card: Push the SD card once to release it. When the SD card springs out, pull it all the way out.
- If you set the [✔ Other Functions] ◎ [Media Access LED] function to [Off], the access indicators will not illuminate.

### Initializing the Recording Media

The first time you use any recording media with this camcorder, initialize it first. You can also initialize a recording media to permanently delete all the data it contains.

When initializing an SD card, you can select quick initialization, which clears the file allocation table but does not physically erase the stored data, or complete initialization, which deletes all data completely.

Operating modes: CAMERA

MEDIA

- 1 Open the [Initialize Media] submenu.
- 2 Select [CF A], [CF B] or [SD Card] and then press SET.

To initialize a CF card

- 3 Select [OK] and then press SET.
- 4 When the confirmation message appears, press SET.
  - The CF card is initialized and all the data it contains is erased.

#### To initialize an SD card

- 3 Select [Complete] (complete initialization) or [Quick] (quick initialization) and then press SET.
- 4 Select [OK] and then press SET.
  - If you are using the [Complete] initialization option, press SET twice to cancel the operation while it is in progress. You can use the SD card but all data will be erased.
- 5 When the confirmation message appears, press SET.
  - The SD card is initialized and all the data it contains is erased.



- Initializing the recording media will permanently erase all data, including clips with an **OK** mark, protected photos, and custom picture information. Lost data cannot be recovered. Make sure you save important recordings in advance.
- Depending on the SD card, the complete initialization may take up to a few minutes.
- While recording on a CF card, you can initialize another CF card in the other CF card slot.

### Switching Between the CF Card Slots

The camcorder features two CF card slots, CFA (CF card slot A) and CFB (CF card slot B). If both slots contain a CF card, you can switch between them as necessary. In addition, if the CF card you are using becomes full while recording, the recording will continue uninterrupted on the other CF card (relay recording). Relay recording is available from CF card slot A to CF card slot B, and vice versa.

Operating modes: CAMERA MEDIA

#### Press the SLOT SELECT button.

 The access indicator of the selected CF card slot will illuminate in green.



- If both CF card slots contain a CF card and you open the cover of the selected slot, the camcorder will automatically switch to the other slot.
- You cannot use the SLOT SELECT button to switch between CF card slots while recording.

### Selecting the CF Card Recording Method

The camcorder features two useful CF card recording methods, relay recording and double slot recording.

Relay recording: This allows you to continue recording on another CF card without interruption if the CF card you are using becomes full. Relay recording is available from CF card slot A to CF card slot B, and vice versa.

Double slot recording: This records the same clip simultaneously to both CF cards, which is a convenient way to make a backup copy of your recording while you record.

Operating modes: CAMERA MEDIA


#### To use relay recording

By default, this function is activated. If it has been deactivated, follow the procedure below to activate it.

- 1 Open the [Relay Rec] submenu.
- 2 Select [On] and then press SET.

#### To use double slot recording

- 1 Open the [Double Slot Rec] submenu.
- 2 Select [On] and then press SET.

# (i) NOTES

- When the bit rate is set to 50 Mbps (\$\sum\_{0}\$ 51) during slow motion recording, relay recording is not available.
- If a CF card becomes full during double slot recording, recording on both cards will stop. On the other hand, if an error occurs with one of the cards, recording will continue on the other card.
- Double slot recording cannot be used with relay recording or slow & fast motion recording.

### Checking the Available Recording Time

When the camcorder is in CAMERA mode, the screen indicates which CF card slot is in use and the available recording time (in minutes\*) that remains on each CF card. When the camcorder is in MEDIA mode, the side panel indicates the available recording time.

On the [Media] status screen ( 181), you can check the available recording time, total space and used space of each recording media, and the available number of photos.

\* The approximate available recording time is based on the current bit rate ( $\square$  51).

### Recovering Data on the CF Card

An error may occur with data on the CF card in cases such as turning off the camcorder while recording or removing the CF card while recording. In such case, you may be able to recover the data on the CF card.

Operating modes: CAMERA MEDIA

- 1 Insert the CF card with the data to be recovered into the camcorder.
- 2 When the screen prompts you to recover the data, select [OK] and then press SET.
- 3 After a message appears indicating that the data has been recovered, press SET.

- This procedure will delete clips shorter than 10 seconds in length. Additionally, up to 10 seconds will be deleted from the end of clips on the CF card.
- In some cases, data may not be recovered, such as when the FAT32 file system is corrupted or the CF card is physically damaged.
- While you are recording, you can recover data on the CF card that is not being recorded to.

Recording

This section explains the recording basics. Before you begin recording, make a test recording first to check if the camcorder operates correctly. Record for approximately 6 minutes at 50 Mbps (\$\sum\_{51}\$). Should the camcorder fail to operate correctly, refer to *Troubleshooting* ( 186). For details on recording audio, refer to Recording Audio (QQ 91).




### Preparing to Record

- 1 Attach a charged battery pack to the camcorder (\$\sum 22\$).
- 2 Insert a CF card into a CF card slot ( 37).
  - Insert another CF card into the other CF card slot to use relay recording (\$\sum 41\$) or double slot recording (\$\sum 42\$).
- 3 Remove the lens cap.
- 4 Adjust the viewfinder.




- The camcorder can add a user memo ( 97) to a clip as you record. It can be used to store information such as the clip name, camera operator and filming location. However, you must set the user memo before recording.
- You can attach commercially available accessories to the handle by using the socket for 0.64 cm (1/4") mounting screws.





### Recording

- 1 Hold down the button on the **POWER** switch and move it to CAMERA (25).
  - The camcorder turns on in CAMERA mode and enters record pause mode.
  - The access indicator for the CF card slot selected for recording illuminates in red and then changes to green.



#### 2 Press the START/STOP button to begin recording.

- Recording starts. The front and rear tally lamps illuminate and the recording indicator [

   REC] appears on the screen.
- You can use the START/STOP button on the side grip, handle or below the iris ring.
- When you use the wireless controller, press the START/STOP button and the record enable button simultaneously.
- 3 Press the START/STOP button to pause the recording.
  - The clip\* is recorded to the CF card and the camcorder enters record pause mode. The tally lamps will also go out.
- \* "Clip" refers to one movie unit from the point you press the START/STOP button to start recording until you press again to pause the recording. You can also include custom picture settings ( 117) and metadata ( 97) with the clip.

- Observe the following precautions while the CFA or CFB access indicator is illuminated in red. Failure to do so may result in permanent data loss
  - Do not open the CF card slot cover of the CF card slot being accessed and remove the CF card.
  - Do not disconnect the power source or turn off the camcorder.
- Be sure to save your recordings regularly ( 156), especially after making important recordings. Canon shall not be liable for any loss or corruption of data.

# (i) NOTES

• The START/STOP button on the handle has a lock lever to prevent accidental operation. Set the lock lever to in cases such as when you do not want a recording inadvertently paused or do not plan to use the START/STOP button. Return the lever to its previous position to enable use of the START/STOP button again.

- You can use the [¥ Other Functions] [Rec Review] setting (□ 103) to review the last clip recorded.
- You can use the [♠ Other Functions] [Clips] [Delete Last Clip] setting (☐ 176) to delete the last clip recorded. Alternatively, you can set an assignable button to [Delete Last Clip]. However, you cannot delete the last clip if double slot recording is on.
- **XFECS** When you set the [**Y** Other Functions] **○** [SDI Rec Command] setting to [On] and you connect the camcorder to another device using the HD/SD SDI terminal, if you start or stop recording with the camcorder, the other device will also start or stop recording. For more details, visit your local Canon Web site.

### Recording in Full Auto Mode

Move the FULL AUTO switch to ON to change the camcorder to full auto mode. In full auto mode, the camcorder automatically sets the iris, gain, shutter speed, and white balance. The camcorder will continuously adjust the brightness and white balance automatically\*. In full auto mode, however, the autofocus will not be turned on.

\* The light metering mode ( $\square$  70) will be set to [Standard], the AE level ( $\square$  70) will be set to [ $\pm$ 0] and the AGC limit ( $\square$  62) will be set to [Off/21 dB].


### **About Clips**

When the camcorder records a clip, it also assigns a 6-character clip name consisting of a 2-letter prefix and 4 numerals (for example, "AA0001"). The numerals increase every time a clip is recorded. You can set the initial clip name in advance using the [✔ Other Functions] [Clips] [Title Prefix] and [Number Setting] options. You cannot change the clip name after the clip is recorded.

The video file (stream) in a clip will be split approximately every 2 GB for clips with a long recording time. Even in such case, playback will be continuous.




- If you are recording with two CF cards and the CF card you are using becomes full while recording, the clip will continue uninterrupted on the other CF card (relay recording). In such case, the recording will be recorded as separate clips.
- If you record using the custom picture and metadata settings, those settings will be recorded with the clip. For more details, refer to Custom Picture Settings ( 117) and Using Metadata ( 97).



### **Power Save Mode**

Activate the power save mode to turn off the screen and reduce battery consumption. At the press of a button, the camcorder will immediately return to record pause mode.

- 1 Hold the POWER SAVE button pressed down for at least 2 seconds.
  - The screen will turn off and the camcorder will switch to power save mode.
  - During power save mode, the tally lamps will flash twice approximately every 3 seconds. The camcorder retains previous time code and camcorder settings.
- 2 Press the POWER SAVE button to return the camcorder to record pause mode.

# Video Configuration: Bit Rate, Resolution and Frame Rate



• For details on the signal output from each terminal, refer to *Video Output Configuration* (\$\sum 149\$).

This camcorder features 4 methods for adjusting the focus. When you use full manual focus or manual focus, you can use the peaking and magnification functions to help you focus more accurately.

Full manual focus (FULL MF): Use the focus ring to adjust the focus. The focus ring is non-perpetual (the ring has physical stops) and you can use the ring's distance indicator. You can focus from 1 m to  $\infty$  throughout the entire zoom range.

Manual focus (MF): Use the focus ring to adjust the focus. The focus ring is perpetual (the ring has no physical stops) and you cannot use the ring's distance indicator.

Autofocus (AF): The camcorder continuously adjusts the focus automatically. When using autofocus, you can select either Instant AF or Normal AF mode. You can also use the focus ring (with no physical stops).

Push AF (PUSH AF): When you are using MF or Normal AF, you can switch the focus to Instant AF while you keep the PUSH AF button pressed down.


In manual focus, autofocus and Push AF modes, you can set the [ $\P$  Camera Setup]  $\bigcirc$  [Focus Limit] setting ( $\bigcirc$  60) to [Off] to focus from 2 cm (at full wide angle) to  $\infty$ . If you set it to [On], the focus range will be 1 m to  $\infty$  throughout the entire zoom range.



### **Full Manual Focus Mode**

When you use full manual focus mode, you can adjust the focus manually using only the focus ring. Because the focus ring is non-perpetual, you can easily know where the macro and infinity ends are. Additionally, the focus ring indicates the approximate distance to the subject.

- 1 Press the PUSH button (unlock focus mode ring button) on the focus mode ring and turn the ring toward FULL MF.
  - [MF] appears on the bottom left of the screen.
- 2 Zoom in to full telephoto.





### 3 Turn the focus ring to adjust the focus.

• When you focus at full telephoto, the image will be in focus throughout the entire zoom range.

### • Using the subject distance display on the screen:


- When the camcorder switches out of autofocus mode or when you adjust the focus with the focus ring, the approximate subject distance is displayed on the screen for approximately 3 seconds.
- Use the subject distance display as an estimate; when the distance reading is not considered very precise for a particular zoom range, it will be displayed in gray.
- $[\infty]$  indicates infinity focus and  $[\infty-]$  indicates over infinity focus.
- You can change the units of distance between meters and feet using the [♥ Other Functions] ⑤ [Custom Function] ⑥ [Obj. Dist. Unit] setting (◯ 129).
- The correct subject distance will not be displayed when the optional WA-H82 Wide Attachment is attached.

### Manual Focus Mode


Turn the focus ring to manually adjust the focus. The faster you turn the focus ring, the more quickly you can focus on your subject.

#### 1 Move the FOCUS switch to M.

• [MF] appears on the bottom left of the screen.




2 Press the PUSH button (unlock focus mode ring button) on the focus mode ring and turn the ring toward AF/MF.



3 Turn the focus ring to adjust the focus.

- When using full manual focus mode:
  - If you turn the focus ring too quickly, the camcorder may not be able to focus immediately. In such case, the camcorder will focus on the subject after you finish turning the focus ring.
  - When you switch the camcorder from manual focus mode to full manual focus mode, the focus will automatically adjust to the position that corresponds to the distance indicator on the focus ring.
  - You cannot adjust the focus using a remote control connected to the REMOTE terminal.
- You can use the focus ring to adjust the focus while you are operating the zoom. When the camcorder is initially in autofocus mode, it will return to autofocus mode after you manually adjust the focus.
- You can set the response sensitivity of the focus ring in manual focus mode using the [¥ Other Functions] ○ [Custom Function] ○ [F. Ring Control] setting (□ 129).
- If you focus manually and then leave the camcorder with the power turned on, the focus on the subject may be lost after a while. This possible slight shift in focus is a result of the internal temperature rising in the camcorder and lens. Check the focus before resuming shooting.
- When an optional RC-V100 Remote Controller is connected to the camcorder, you can adjust the focus with the remote controller's FOCUS dial. At default settings, turn the dial right to focus farther and left to focus nearer.



### **Using the Focus Assistance Functions**

In order to focus more accurately during full manual focus mode or manual focus mode, you can use two focus assistance functions – peaking, which creates a clearer contrast by emphasizing the outlines of the subject, and magnifying, which enlarges the image on the screen. You can use both functions simultaneously for greater effect.

You can also use the [ $\P$  Other Functions]  $\P$  [Custom Function]  $\P$  [F. Assist. B&W] setting ( $\P$  129) to switch the screen to black & white while using the focus assistance functions.

#### Peaking

The camcorder offers two peaking levels. Select the level before activating peaking.

1 Open the [Select] submenu (under [Peaking]) to select the peaking level.

2 Select the desired level and then press SET.

3 Press the PEAKING button.

- The peaking icon (PEAK1) or PEAK2) appears and the outlines in the image will be emphasized.
- Press the button again to turn off peaking.

- Peaking appears only on the camcorder screen. It will not appear on an external monitor connected to the camcorder.
- Peaking will not affect your recordings.
- You can set the color, gain and frequency of the two peaking levels independently of each other.


### Magnification

#### Press the MAGN, button.

- MAGID appears on the bottom of the screen and the center of the screen is magnified approximately 2 times\*.
- Press the button again to cancel the function.


- Magnification appears only on the camcorder screen. It will not appear





The camcorder uses the TTL autofocus system and continuously adjusts the focus on the subject in the center of the screen. The focusing range is 2 cm (at full wide-angle, measured from the front of the lens barrel) to  $\infty$ .

During autofocus mode, you can turn the focus ring to focus manually. When you stop turning the focus ring, the camcorder returns to autofocus mode. This is useful in situations such as when focusing on a subject on the other side of a window.

1 Press the PUSH button (unlock focus mode ring button) on the focus mode ring and turn the ring toward AF/MF.



#### Setting the Autofocus Mode

You can select how the camcorder focuses during autofocus mode.

1 Open the autofocus [Speed] submenu.

2 Select the desired option and then press SET.

### Options

[Instant]:

Sets the autofocus mode to Instant AF. The focus is adjusted at the highest speed. This mode is useful even when recording in very bright or low-light surroundings. This mode uses both the

TTL system and external sensor for focusing.

[Normal]: Sets the autofocus mode to Normal AF. The autofocus

adjustment is made at a stable speed.



During manual focus mode or Normal AF mode, press the PUSH AF button and hold it pressed down.

 The autofocus (Instant AF mode) is activated as long as you hold the PUSH AF button pressed down. You can also use the PUSH AF button on the optional ZR-2000 Zoom Remote Controller.



- When recording in bright surroundings, the camcorder closes down the aperture. This may cause the picture to appear blurred and is more noticeable toward the wide-angle end of the zoom range. Turn the built-in ND filter on/off according to the screen display (\$\sum\$71).
- When you attach the optional WA-H82 Wide Attachment to the camcorder, Instant AF and PUSH AF are not available.
- Autofocus takes longer to focus when the frame rate is set to [25P] than when it is set to [50i].
- When recording under dark conditions, the focusing range narrows and the picture may appear blurred.



- Autofocus may not work well on the following subjects or in the following cases. In such case, focus manually.
  - Reflective surfaces
  - Subjects with low contrast or without vertical lines
  - Fast moving subjects
  - Through dirty or wet windows
  - Night scenes


### **Detecting and Focusing On Faces**

The camcorder can detect a person's face during autofocus mode, automatically focus on it, and even track it if the person moves. When there are a number of people in the picture, one person (with the white face detection frame) will be determined to be the main subject and the camcorder will focus on that person's face.

- 1 Open the [Face AF] submenu.
  - [ Camera Setup] [ [AF Mode] [ Face AF]
- 2 Select [On] and then press SET.
- 3 Set an assignable button to [Select Face] ( 115).
- 4 Point the camcorder at the subject.
  - If there is more than one person in the picture, the camcorder will automatically select one person it determines is the main subject.
     The camcorder will indicate the main subject with a white face detection frame and other faces with gray frames.
  - To change the main subject when there is more than one person, press the assignable button set to [Select Face].

# $(\mathbf{i})$ notes


- The camcorder may mistakenly detect the faces of non-human subjects. In such case, turn face detection off.
- In certain cases, faces may not be detected correctly. Typical examples include:
  - Faces extremely small, large, dark or bright in relation to the overall picture.
  - Faces that are turned to the side, at a diagonal or partially hidden.
- Face detection cannot be used in the following cases:
  - When the shutter speed used is slower than 1/25.
  - When using slow & fast motion recording mode and the shooting frame rate is set to less than 24P.
  - When [§ Other Functions]  $\bigcirc$  [Custom Function]  $\bigcirc$  [Scan Reverse Rec] is set to [Both], [Vertical] or [Horizontal].
- When a subject's face is detected, the camcorder adds an event marker to that frame. You can then use the Canon XF Utility software to search for event marks in a clip.

# Adjusting the Focus

• If you set an assignable button to [Face AF] (\(\sum\_115\)), you can press the button to activate this autofocus mode.



### **Focus Limit and Macro Shooting**

By default, the camcorder's focus range allows macro shooting. You can activate the focus limit to restrict the focus range. The focus range 2 cm to  $\infty$  (at full wide-angle) is limited to 1 m to  $\infty$  (throughout the entire zoom range).

- 1 Open the [Focus Limit] submenu.
  - [ Camera Setup] [ Focus Limit]
- 2 Select [On] and then press SET.
  - Select [Off] to enable macro shooting.
- (i) NOTES
- When the camcorder is in full manual focus mode, the focus limit will be activated.
- If you set an assignable button to [Focus Limit] (
   115), you can press
  the button to activate the focus limit.

Use the image stabilizer to compensate for camcorder shake in order to achieve steadier shots. There are 3 methods of image stabilization; select the method that best suits your needs.

[Dynamic] (4): Dynamic IS compensates for a higher degree of

> camcorder shake, such as when shooting while walking, and is more effective as the zoom approaches full wide

angle.

[Standard] (4): Standard IS compensates for a lower degree of

> camcorder shake, such as when shooting while remaining stationary, and is suitable for shooting natural-looking

[Off]: Use this setting when the camcorder is mounted on a

tripod.

# $(\,\mathbf{i}\,)$ notes

- By default, assignable button 1 is set to [Standard] but you can also set it for another assignable button instead. You can press the button to activate standard IS.
- If you set an assignable button to [Dynamic IS] or [Powered IS] (III 115), you can press the button to turn the assigned mode on or off.
- If the degree of camcorder shake is too high, the image stabilizer may not be able to fully compensate.
- When you are using [Dynamic] mode, the edges of the picture may be adversely affected (such as ghosting, artifacts and dark areas) when compensating for a high degree of camcorder shake.

### Gain

The gain control adjusts the level of the video signal generated depending on the lighting and shooting conditions. You can select automatic or manual gain control.

Operating modes: CAMERA



### **Automatic Gain Control (AGC)**

Automatically adjusts the gain based on the subject's brightness.

#### Set the AGC switch to ON.

- The A icon appears next to the gain value on the screen.
- When you set the camcorder to full auto mode (\$\sum\_45\$), automatic gain control will be activated.

### Setting the Gain Limit (AGC Limit)

When the AGC switch is set to ON, you can activate the gain limit to prevent the camcorder from setting a level higher than a preset limit between 3 dB and 18 dB.

- 1 Open the [AGC Limit] submenu.
  - [ Camera Setup] [ [AGC Limit]
- 2 Select the desired level and then press SET.



- When you set the camcorder to full auto mode ( 45), [AGC Limit] will be set to [Off/21 dB].
- When the [Gamma] setting in the custom picture file is set to [Wide DR], the gain limit cannot be set to 3 dB.





Gain Recording

#### Manual Gain Control

Set the AGC switch to OFF to set the gain manually. You can select one of 3 preset gain levels (L: low, M: middle, H: high) to which you can independently assign gain values. You can also fine-tune the gain in 0.5 dB increments.

### Assigning Gain Values to the GAIN Switch Positions

You can assign separate gain values to the L, M and H positions of the GAIN switch.

- 1 Open the [Gain] submenu.
  - [ Camera Setup] [Gain]
- 2 Select [L], [M] or [H] and then press SET.
- 3 Select the desired gain level.
  - To fine-tune the gain, select [Fine Tuning] and then select the desired gain level.
  - Repeat steps 2 and 3 to set other switch positions, as necessary.





#### **Exposure Bar**



Exposure bar

When the gain and aperture are set to manual and the shutter speed is not set to auto, the exposure bar will appear on the screen. The exposure bar indicates the approximate exposure adjustment within a range of  $\pm$ 2 EV. Beyond this range, the indicator will flash.

- When you select high gain levels, the picture may flicker slightly. The 33.0 dB gain level in particular, allows you to shoot video with a higher sensitivity but is more prone to the appearance of noise and artifacts (white dots, vertical streaks or blocking).
- You can use the [Y Other Functions] [Custom Function] [Shockless Gain] setting (□ 129) for a smooth transition when changing the position of the GAIN switch.
- When an optional RC-V100 Remote Controller is connected to the camcorder, you can adjust the gain value corresponding to the current position of the GAIN switch (L, M or H) with the remote controller's ISO/ GAIN ▲/▼ buttons.

Set the shutter speed based on the recording conditions. For example, you may want to set slower shutter speeds in darker environments. The camcorder offers the following 6 modes.

Operating modes: CAMERA MEDIA

OFF: The camcorder uses a standard shutter speed based on the frame rate

Auto: The camcorder automatically adjusts the shutter speed based on the picture's brightness. This mode is not available during slow & fast motion recording mode. In this mode, [A] will appear on the screen next to the shutter speed.

Speed: Allows you to set the shutter speed (in fractions of a second).

Angle: You can set the shutter angle to determine the shutter speed.

Clear Scan: Set the frequency in order to record CRT computer monitors without displaying black bands or flicker on the screen.

Slow Shutter: You can set slower shutter speeds to obtain brighter recordings in places with insufficient lighting. This mode is not available during slow & fast motion recording mode.



# **Shutter Speed**



### Changing the Shutter Speed Mode

- 1 Set the SHUTTER switch to ON.
  - The shutter speed displayed on the bottom of the screen changes depending on the mode. For modes other than auto, the setting appears highlighted in orange.
  - Set the SHUTTER switch to OFF to use the standard shutter speed based on the frame rate. In that case, the rest of the procedure is not necessary.
- 2 Slide the SHUTTER switch toward SEL to change the mode.
  - Repeat step 2 until the desired mode is reached. The shutter speed mode changes in the following order:
     Auto → Speed → Angle → Clear Scan → Slow Shutter
  - If you selected auto mode, the rest of this procedure is not necessary.
- 3 Use the joystick or turn the SELECT dial to adjust the setting.
  - For clear scan mode, adjust the frequency so that black bands do not appear.
- 4 Press SET.
  - The orange frame will disappear. The selected setting and shutter speed mode will be set.
  - To change the mode again, start from step 2.

#### **Using Slow Shutter Mode**

When recording in dark surroundings, you can obtain a brighter picture by using slow shutter mode. You can also use this mode when you wish to add certain effects to your recordings, such as blurring the background during panning shots or recording a moving subject with an afterimage trail.

- Image quality may not be as good as when using faster shutter speeds in brighter surroundings.
- · Autofocus may not work well.

- When you record under bright conditions using automatic aperture control, the camcorder closes down the aperture. This may cause the picture to appear blurred. To prevent this, set the shutter speed to 1/100 or faster.
- When you set the camcorder to full auto mode ( 45), the shutter speed mode will be set to auto.
- When the gain and aperture are set to manual and the shutter speed is not set to auto, the exposure bar will appear on the screen (\$\subset\$ 64).
- When an optional RC-V100 Remote Controller is connected to the camcorder, you can change the shutter mode with the remote controller's SHUTTER SELECT button, regardless of the position of the camcorder's SHUTTER switch.

### Flicker Reduction

You can reduce flicker caused by recording under fluorescent lamps.

- 1 Open the [Flicker Reduction] submenu.
  - [ Camera Setup] [Flicker Reduction]
- 2 Select [Automatic] and then press SET.



# Adjusting the Aperture

You can affect the brightness of your recordings or change the depth of field by adjusting the aperture. Increase the aperture value (F8 to F9.5) so that objects that are close and far away will be in focus. You can have the camcorder adjust the aperture automatically or you can manually adjust it to give you more control over your recording.

Operating modes: CAMERA





### **Automatic Aperture Control**

The camcorder automatically adjusts the aperture based on the brightness of the subject.

#### Set the IRIS switch to A.


- The A icon appears next to the aperture value on the screen.
- When you set the camcorder to full auto mode (\$\sum 45\$), the camcorder automatically controls the aperture.

### **Manual Aperture Control**

Use the iris ring to manually control the aperture.

- 1 Set the IRIS switch to M.
- 2 Turn the iris ring to adjust the aperture.
  - The f-number displayed on the screen will be in 1/4-stop increments.

- You can use the [✔ Other Functions] [Custom Function] [Iris Limit] setting (☐ 129) to prevent the aperture from closing below the diffraction limit of the lens (F9.5). When it is on, the maximum aperture value is [F9.5]. When it is off, you can fully close the aperture but aperture values that exceed the diffraction limit will appear in gray. Using aperture values displayed in gray will cause diffraction blur.



# Adjusting the Aperture

- When you set the aperture value manually, it is not retained if you
  activate automatic aperture control (excluding full auto mode). The
  aperture value set automatically by the camcorder will be retained when
  you switch back to manual aperture control.
- When you activate the built-in ND filter, the picture may become dark when you set a high aperture value. In such case, set the ND filter to OFF and readjust the aperture.
- You can use the [
   Other Functions] 
   [Custom Function] 
   [I. Ring Direction] setting (
   129) to change the direction of the adjustment when you turn the iris ring.
- When an optional RC-V100 Remote Controller is connected to the camcorder, you can adjust the aperture with the remote controller's IRIS dial. At default settings, turn the dial right to open up the aperture (smaller F value) and left to close the aperture (larger F value).

# Temporary Manual Aperture Control Override (PUSH AUTO IRIS)

During manual aperture control mode, press and hold the PUSH AUTO IRIS button. While you keep the button pressed, the camcorder automatically adjusts the aperture to achieve optimal aperture value and exposure. When the shutter speed mode is set to auto ( $\square$  65) and the AGC switch is set to ON ( $\square$  62) in advance, the shutter speed and gain will be adjusted automatically based on the aperture value.

### 1 Press and hold the PUSH AUTO IRIS button.

 The camcorder automatically sets the exposure. The aperture value, shutter speed and gain values displayed on the screen will change accordingly.

#### 2 Release the PUSH AUTO IRIS button.

- The camcorder returns to manual aperture control mode.
- The aperture value set by the camcorder will override the previous setting.





Select the light metering mode to match the recording conditions. This will ensure that your subject will have a more suitable exposure level.

- 2 Select the desired option and then press SET.
  - The icon of the selected mode appears on the left side of the screen.

#### **Options**

[Backlight] \*: Suitable when recording backlit scenes.

[Standard]: Averages the light metered from the entire screen, giving

more weight to the subject in the center.

[Spotlight] : Use this option when recording a scene in which only a

certain part of the picture is lit.

- When you set the camcorder to full auto mode ( 45), [Light Metering] will be set to [Standard].
- If you set an assignable button to [Backlight] or [Spotlight] (
   115), you can press the button to change the light metering mode.

# Using the ND Filter

Using the ND filters allows you keep the aperture within an appropriate range when recording in bright surroundings\*.

\* When recording in bright surroundings, the camcorder closes down the aperture. This may cause the picture to appear blurred depending on the zoom position. Using the ND filter or setting a faster shutter speed can reduce such blur.

Operating modes: CAMERA MEDIA

#### Set the ND FILTER switch to the desired setting.



• Depending on the scene, the color may change when turning the ND filter on/off. Setting a custom white balance ( 74) may be effective in such case.



### White Balance

The camcorder uses an electronic white balance process to calibrate the picture for accurate color display under different lighting conditions. There are 4 methods of setting the white balance.

Auto white balance: The camcorder automatically adjusts the white balance to the optimal level.

Preset white balance: Set the white balance to either [Daylight] or [Tungsten].

Set color temperature: Allows you to set the color temperature between 2,000 K and 15,000 K.

Custom white balance: You can use a white object to measure the white balance and set it to one of two preset positions.

When recording under fluorescent lights, we recommend using auto white balance or setting the custom white balance.



 The [Color Matrix] and [White Balance] custom picture settings (117) take precedence over the white balance settings.



### **Auto White Balance**

The camcorder constantly adjusts the white balance automatically to achieve an optimal level. The camcorder will adjust the white balance if the light source changes.

#### Set the AWB switch to ON.



  - Use the same lighting conditions you plan to use when recording.

  - After the icon stops flashing, the procedure is completed. The setting is retained even if you turn off the camcorder.





- With the [ Camera Setup] [ Tele-converter] setting, you can increase the focal length\* by a factor of approximately 1.5, 3 or 6. Alternatively, you can set an assignable button to [Tele-converter] (115) to activate the digital tele-converter and select the magnification factor.

\*The image is digitally processed, so the image resolution may deteriorate.



#### Using the Zoom Ring

Zoom in and out on a subject by turning the zoom ring after you set the ZOOM switch to RING. The zoom speed depends on how fast you turn the zoom ring.

#### $(\mathbf{i})$ notes

- If you turn the zoom ring too quickly, the camcorder may not be able to zoom immediately. In such case, the camcorder will zoom after you finish turning the zoom ring.
- When you set the ZOOM switch to RING, the zoom position will move to the current position of the zoom ring, which will change the picture angle. Also, the picture may become out of focus.





#### Zooming

- Attaching the optional WA-H82 Wide Attachment decreases the camcorder's focal length by a factor of 0.8. However, the zoom ratio at the telephoto end will be approximately 4x. When you use the wide attachment, set [► Camera Setup] [Vide Attach. Lens] to [WA-H82]. This will set the image stabilization to suit the wide attachment. Also, the AF mode will be set to Normal AF.
- When an optional RC-V100 Remote Controller is connected to the camcorder, you can zoom with the remote controller's ZOOM dial. At default settings, turn the dial right to zoom in (T) and left to zoom out (W).







#### Displaying Zebra Patterns

This camcorder has a zebra pattern feature that shows black and white diagonal stripes over areas that are overexposed. This is displayed only on the screen and will not affect your recordings. There are two types of zebra patterns and you can display both simultaneously. Zebra 1 lets you identify areas within a certain range (±5 of a specified level) while zebra 2 lets you identify areas that are over a specified level. When you display both simultaneously and they overlap, only zebra 1 will be displayed in those areas.





#### Configuring the Edge Monitor

Using this video scope allows you to focus with more precision when the camcorder is in full manual focus or manual focus mode. The edge monitor features 2 modes.

  - [¥ Other Functions] ⊘ [WFM (LCD)] ⊘ [Edge Monitor]
- 2 Select the desired option and then press SET.

#### **Options**

- [Type 1]: The waveform that represents the focus of the entire picture is displayed in green. In addition, the waveform of the area in the three red frames is displayed in red on top of the previous waveform.
- [Type 2]: This mode displays the edge monitor with the waveform monitor in [Line+Spot] mode. The waveform monitor appears on the left in green while the edge monitor appears on the right in blue. The waveform of the area in the red frame is displayed in red on top of the edge monitor waveform.

#### Adding Shot Marks while Recording

When recording, you can flag an important shot in a clip by adding a "shot mark" ([S]). There are two types of shot marks, shot mark 1 ([S]) and shot mark 2 ([S]), and you can add either or both types to a single clip. When the camcorder is in MEDIA mode, you can add or delete shot marks ([C]) 147). You can also display an index screen of all the shot marks ([C]) 145), allowing you to find a particular scene in a clip more quickly.

Operating modes: CAMERA MEDIA

To add a shot mark to a clip while recording, you must first set in advance an assignable button to [Add Shot Mark 1] or [Add Shot Mark 2]. You can also press the SHOT1 button on the wireless controller to add the [st] mark.

Alternatively, you can use an external time code signal (\(\textit{XF305}\) only). When the time code is recorded, it will include the 3 seconds before the START/STOP button was pressed. When special recording mode is deactivated, the running mode will return to its previous setting.


# **Optical Axis Shift**

This function aids in a dual camera setup for 3D recording by allowing you to adjust the position of the image stabilization lens.

Operating modes: CAMERA



- 1 Open the [Enable] submenu to activate optical axis shift.
  - [ Camera Setup] ( [Axis Shift] ( Enable]
- 2 Select [On] and then press SET.
  - Axis appears on the bottom of the screen.

- The range of adjustment depends on the current zoom position.
- The more the lens position is adjusted, the bigger the deviation at the center of the picture will be during zoom. By centering on an object at full telephoto and then adjusting at full wide-angle, the amount of amount of deviation will be reduced.

# Using the Focal Length Guide


The focal length guide aids you when using two camcorders for 3D recording. The guide appears as a numerical value and has a range of 195 steps. You can set the guide to 0 at any point in the zoom range to help precisely calibrate both camcorders.

Operating modes: CAMERA



- 1 Set up two camcorders and align their picture angle at full telephoto.
- 2 Open the [Focal Length Guide] submenu.
  - [ Camera Setup] [ Zoom] [ Focal Length Guide]

- The same picture angle for both camcorders cannot be guaranteed.



## Using the GP-E2 GPS Receiver

When you attach the optional GP-E2 GPS Receiver to the camcorder, you can acquire GPS information and add it to your clips. For details about how to attach and use the receiver, refer also to the receiver's instruction manual.

Operating modes: CAMERA MEDIA



When connecting the GP-E2 GPS Receiver to the camcorder, use the connecting cable supplied with the receiver.

After connecting the receiver, we recommend that you place the receiver in the carrying case supplied with the receiver and attach it to the grip belt or carry it on your person.



- In certain countries and regions, the use of GPS may be restricted. Therefore, be sure to use GPS in accordance with the laws and regulations of your country or region. Be particularly careful when traveling outside your home country.







You can preset a number of picture-related settings (\infty 122). After changing individual settings to your preference, you can save the whole set in the camcorder or SD card as a custom picture file. Conversely, you can have the camcorder record clips and photos without embedding custom picture settings.

## **Renaming Custom Picture Files**

1 After selecting a file, open the [Rename] submenu.

## **Available Custom Picture Settings**

The following are the available settings. Even if no custom picture file is selected, the default settings are still applied to the picture.

#### Gamma

The gamma curve changes the overall look of the image. (Default: [Normal 1]).

[Normal 1] to [Normal 4]: These settings are suitable for viewing the image

on a TV monitor. Highlights in [Normal 2] are brighter than those of [Normal 1]. Dark tones in the lower part of the gamma curve for [Normal 3] (ITU-R BT.709 standard) and [Normal 4] are more pronounced than those of [Normal 2].

[Cine 1] or [Cine 2]: Use [Cine 1] for a gamma curve that results in a

picture with a cinema-like feel and cinema-like tones. [Cine 2] has softer contrasts than does [Cine 1] but is also suitable for creating a

cinema-like picture.

[Wide DR]: Applies a gamma curve with a very wide

dynamic range, optimized for playback on an




[Hlt.Pri.]: Use Highlight Priority to obtain a natural

### Black

Controls the black level and color cast of blacks.

### Master Pedestal

The master pedestal increases or decreases the black level. Higher settings will make dark areas brighter but decrease contrast. This setting can be adjusted from -50 to 50. (Default: 0)

### Master Black

Corrects color cast in blacks.

[Red]: -50 to 50 (Default: 0) [Green]: -50 to 50 (Default: 0) [Blue]: -50 to 50 (Default: 0)

### Black Gamma


Controls the lower part of the gamma curve (dark areas of the image). When [Gamma] is set to [Wide DR] or [Hlt.Pri.], this setting has no effect on the picture.

[Level]: Raises or lowers the lower part of the gamma curve. This setting can be adjusted from -50 to 50. (Default: 0)

[Range]: Selects the range in which dark areas are affected. This setting can be adjusted from -5 to 50. (Default: 0)

[Point]: Determines the shape of the lower part of the gamma curve. This setting can be adjusted from -1 to 50. (Default: 0)

### Black Gamma



### Low Key Saturation

Adjusts color saturation in dark areas.

[Enable]: Activates/deactivates the setting. (Default: [Off])

[Level]: Specifies how saturated colors are in dark areas. This setting can be adjusted from -50 to 50. (Default: 0)

### Knee

Controls the upper part of the gamma curve (highlights of the image). By compressing the highlights, you can prevent parts of the image from being overexposed. When [Gamma] is set to [Cine 1], [Cine 2], [Wide DR] or [Hlt.Pri.], this setting has no effect on the picture.

[Enable]: Activates/deactivates the setting. (Default: [On])

[Automatic]: Select [On] to have the camcorder automatically set the knee point and slope to prevent images being overexposed so quickly. Select [Off] to manually adjust the knee point.

(Default: [On])

[Slope]: Determines the slope of the gamma curve above the knee

point. This setting can be adjusted from -35 to 50.

(Default: 0)


[Point]: Sets the knee point of the gamma curve. This setting can be


adjusted from 50 to 109. (Default: 95)

[Saturation]: Adjusts color saturation in highlights when [Automatic] is set

to [Off]. This setting can be adjusted from -10 to 10.

(Default: 0)





## Sharpness

Sets the sharpness of the output and recording signal.

[Level]: Sets the sharpness level. This setting can be adjusted

from -10 to 50. (Default: 0)

[H Detail Freq.]: Sets the center frequency of horizontal sharpness.

Setting higher values increases the frequency, which, in turn, increases the sharpness. This setting can be

adjusted from -8 to 8. (Default: 0)

[Coring]: Reduces noise artifacts caused by high sharpness levels.

[Level]: Sets the coring level. Higher values prevent sharpness from being applied to minute details, resulting in less noise. This setting can be adjusted from -30 to 50. (Default: 0)

[D-Ofst]: You can use [D-Ofst], [D-Curve] and [D-Depth] to adjust the coring level based on brightness. [D-Ofst] sets the coring level of the minimum brightness level. This setting can be adjusted from 0 to 50. (Default: 0)

[D-Curve]: Sets the curve of the coring adjustment. This curve is the change from [Level] to [D-Ofst]. This setting can be adjusted from 0 to 8. (Default: 0)

[D-Depth]: Sets a multiplier to [D-Ofst] that determines the coring level adjustment based on brightness. Positive values raise the coring level in dark areas and negative values lower the level. This setting can be adjusted from -4 to 4. (Default: 0)

[HV Detail Bal.]: Adjusts the ratio between horizontal and vertical detail. Higher values emphasize vertical detail while lower values emphasize horizontal detail. This setting can be adjusted from -8 to 8. (Default: 0)

[Limit]: Restricts how much sharpness is applied. This setting

can be adjusted from -50 to 50. (Default: 0)

[Select]: In addition to the sharpness set by [Level], [Select] sets

the sharpness for areas with higher frequencies. Higher values apply more sharpness to areas with higher frequencies. Use this for subjects in which normal sharpening is not effective. This setting is not available when the resolution is 720P. This setting can be adjusted

from 0 to 15. (Default: 0)

[Knee Aperture]: Allows you to set the sharpness of only the areas above

the knee point by adjusting the gain and slope. When [Gamma] is set to [Cine 1], [Cine 2], [Wide DR] or [Hlt.Pri.], this setting has no effect on the picture.

[Gain]: Sets the amount of sharpness. This setting can be adjusted from 0 to 9. (Default: 0)

[Slope]: Sets the slope of the sharpness. This setting can be adjusted from 0 to 3, with 0 having no slope, 1 having a steep slope and 3 having a gradual slope. (Default: 1)

[Level Depend]: Lowers the amount of sharpness applied to dark areas of the image.

[Level]: Sets the brightness of the dark areas of the image that will be affected. This setting can be adjusted from 0 to 50. (Default: 0)

[Slope]: Determines the slope of the area between the upper and lower parts of the gamma curve. This setting can be adjusted from 0 to 3, with 0 having no slope, 1 having a steep slope and 3 having a gradual slope. (Default: 0)

[Offset]: Adjusts the sharpness level of dark areas in the image. Setting higher values will lower the sharpness level. This setting can be adjusted from 0 to 50. (Default: 0)

### Noise Reduction

Reduces the amount of noise that appears in the image. Select [Automatic] to have the camcorder adjust the noise automatically. Otherwise, select a level from 1 (lowest level) to 8 (highest level), or select [Off] to turn the noise reduction off. (Default: [Automatic])

## Skin Detail

The camcorder applies a softening filter to areas in the picture with skin tones to give a more pleasant appearance. By changing these settings, you can determine what areas will be detected as skin tones. A zebra pattern will appear over areas on the screen that are detected as having skin tones.

[Effect Level]: Adjusts the level of the filter. The available options are [Off],

[Low], [Middle] and [High]. (Default: [Off])

[Hue]: Adjusts the hue for detection of skin tones. This setting can

be adjusted from -16 to 16. (Default: 0)

[Chroma]: Adjusts the color saturation for detection of skin tones. This

setting can be adjusted from 0 to 31. (Default: 16)

[Area]: Adjusts the color range for detection of skin tones. This

setting can be adjusted from 0 to 31. (Default: 16)

[Y Level]: Adjusts the brightness for detection of skin tones. This

setting can be adjusted from 0 to 31. (Default: 16)

### Selective Noise Reduction

The camcorder detects the characteristics of a certain color or tone and applies a noise reduction filter to the targeted areas. A zebra pattern will appear over targeted areas on the screen.

[Effect Level]: Adjusts the level of the noise reduction filter. The available

options are [Off], [Low], [Middle] and [High]. (Default: [Off])

[Hue]: Adjusts the hue for the color to be detected. This setting

can be adjusted from 0 to 31. (Default: 0)

[Chroma]: Adjusts the color saturation for the color to be detected.

This setting can be adjusted from 0 to 31. (Default: 16)

[Area]: Adjusts the color range for the color to be detected. This

setting can be adjusted from 0 to 31. (Default: 16)

[Y Level]: Adjusts the brightness for the color to be detected. This

setting can be adjusted from 0 to 31. (Default: 16)

### Color Matrix

Color matrix affects the color tones throughout the whole image.

[Select]: Available options are [Normal 1] to [Normal 4], [Cine 1] and [Cine 2], [Wide DR] and [Hlt.Pri.]. Generally, this is the same setting as [Gamma]. After selecting an option, you can make more precise adjustments. (Default: [Normal 1])

[Gain]: Adjusts the color intensity. This setting can be adjusted from -50 to 50. (Default: 0)

[Phase]: Adjusts the color phase. This setting can be adjusted from -18 to 18. (Default: 0)

[R-G]: The R-G matrix changes the tint of the picture along the cyan/ green and red/magenta gradations. This setting can be adjusted from -50 to 50. (Default: 0)

[R-B]: The R-B matrix changes the tint of the picture along the cyan/blue and red/yellow gradations. This setting can be adjusted from -50 to 50. (Default: 0)

[G-R]: The G-R matrix changes the tint of the picture along the magenta/red and green/cyan gradations. This setting can be adjusted from -50 to 50. (Default: 0)

[G-B]: The G-B matrix changes the tint of the picture along the magenta/blue and green/yellow gradations. This setting can be adjusted from -50 to 50. (Default: 0)

[B-R]: The B-R matrix changes the tint of the picture along the yellow/red and blue/cyan gradations. This setting can be adjusted from -50 to 50. (Default: 0)

[B-G]: The B-G matrix changes the tint of the picture along the yellow/ green and blue/magenta gradations. This setting can be adjusted from -50 to 50. (Default: 0)

### White Balance

Adjusts the amount of white balance throughout the whole image.

[R Gain]: Adjust the intensity of red tones. This setting can be adjusted from -50 to 50. (Default: 0)

[G Gain]: Adjust the intensity of green tones. This setting can be adjusted from -50 to 50. (Default: 0)

[B Gain]: Adjust the intensity of blue tones. This setting can be adjusted from -50 to 50. (Default: 0)

### Color Correction

The camcorder detects the characteristics of a certain color (color phase, chroma, area and Y level) and corrects them when recording. You can set the color correction for up to two different areas (A and B).

[Select Area]: Selects the area or areas to correct. Available options are

[Area A], [Area B] and [Area A&B]. Select [Off] to turn this setting off. (Default: [Off])

[Area A Setting]: Determines the area in which colors will be corrected.

[Phase]: Adjusts the color phase for area A. This setting can be adjusted from 0 to 31. (Default: 0)

[Chroma]: Adjusts the color saturation for area A. This setting can be adjusted from 0 to 31. (Default: 16)

[Area]: Adjusts the color range for area A. This setting can be adjusted from 0 to 31. (Default: 16)

[Y Level]: Adjusts the brightness for area A. This setting can be adjusted from 0 to 31. (Default: 16)

[Area A Revision]: Sets the amount of correction for area A.

[Level]: Adjusts the amount of correction to the color saturation. This setting can be adjusted from -50 to 50. (Default: 0)

[Phase]: Adjusts the amount of correction to the color phase. This setting can be adjusted from -18 to 18. (Default: 0)

[Area B Setting]: Determines the area in which colors will be corrected.

[Phase]: Adjusts the color phase for area B. This setting can be adjusted from 0 to 31. (Default: 0)

[Chroma]: Adjusts the color saturation for area B. This setting can be adjusted from 0 to 31. (Default: 16)

[Area]: Adjusts the color range for area B. This setting can be adjusted from 0 to 31. (Default: 16)

[Y Level]: Adjusts the brightness for area B. This setting can be adjusted from 0 to 31. (Default: 16)

[Area B Revision]: Sets the amount of correction for area B.

[Level]: Adjusts the amount of correction to the color saturation. This setting can be adjusted from -50 to 50. (Default: 0)

[Phase]: Adjusts the amount of correction to the color phase. This setting can be adjusted from -18 to 18. (Default: 0)

### Other Functions

[Setup Level]: Adjusts the black level set by the [Black] and [Master Pedestal] settings.

[Level]: Determines the amount of adjustment to be made. This setting can be adjusted from -50 to 50. (Default: 0)

[Press]: Compresses the dynamic range of the video signal so that it does not exceed 100%. Available options are [On] and [Off]. (Default: [Off])

[Clip At 100%]: When the video signal exceeds 100%, this function clips the white level at 100%. (Default: [Off])

[S/N Priority]: Select [On] to give priority to the image's S/N ratio. (Default: [Off])

- When [Gamma] is set to [Hlt.Pri.] (Highlight Priority), the following adjustments are recommended.

  - On an external monitor: Increase the screen's brightness.
- When an optional RC-V100 Remote Controller is connected to the camcorder, the following custom picture settings can be changed using the buttons and dials on the remote controller. They cannot be changed from the camcorder while the RC-V100 is connected.

  - [Black Gamma] ( Level)
  - [Knee] [Slope] and [Point] (only when [Knee] □ [Enable] is set to [On])
  - [Sharpness] (Sharpness)
  - [White Balance] [R Gain], [B Gain]




## Clip Index Screen

• The camcorder switches to MEDIA mode and the clip index screen appears.



- 1 Press the INDEX button.
  - The index screen selection menu appears.

  - Select [Cancel] instead to cancel the operation.

## **Playing Back Clips**

You can play back clips from the clip index screen, [M Mark] index screen and [✓ Mark] index screen. Use the playback control buttons on the handle.

- 1 Move the orange selection frame to the clip you want to play back.
- 2 Press the ►/II button to start playback.
- Playback will start from the clip selected and continue until the end of the last clip in the index screen. When the last frame of the last clip is reached, playback will be paused.
- Press the ►/II button again to pause the playback.
- Press the button to stop the playback and return to the index screen.





You can add an I mark, I mark or both marks to a clip during playback or playback pause. You can add either mark using assignable buttons or an I mark using the wireless controller's SHOT1 button.

- 2 During playback or playback pause, press the assignable button at the point in the clip to add the shot mark.
  - A message indicating the shot mark appears on the screen and the shot mark is added to the clip.
  - Adding a shot mark to a clip during playback will pause the playback.
  - Up to 100 shot marks (1) and 1) marks combined) can be added to a single clip.
  - There may be up to a 0.5 second delay from when you press the button to when the camcorder adds the shot mark.

Besides playing back a clip, you can perform other operations such as deleting a clip or displaying clip information. This is done through the clip menu, which contains different functions depending on the index screen. You can use the functions in the [ Other Functions] menu to perform some of the operations on all the clips. 

## Adding **OK** Marks or **☑** Marks

If you add an OK mark ( $\overline{\mathbb{M}}$ ) or check mark ( $\overline{\mathbb{M}}$ ) to a clip, you can later display an index screen that shows only the clips with an  $\overline{\mathbb{M}}$  mark or only the clips with a  $\overline{\mathbb{M}}$  mark. 





Then, select the video signal output configuration ( $\square$  149). The camcorder can output video from all of the video output terminals simultaneously.


# Superimposing Onscreen Displays to Appear on an External Monitor

You can choose to superimpose onscreen displays on the video output from the HD/SD SDI terminal (**XTEOS** only), HDMI OUT terminal, HD/SD COMPONENT OUT terminal, AV terminal or VIDEO 2 terminal. Doing so will display the onscreen displays on an external monitor. You must set this function separately for HD and SD output. This setting will not affect your recordings.

- 1 Open the [HD Onscreen Disp.] or [SD Onscreen Disp.] submenu.
  [□ Video Setup] [HD Onscreen Disp.] or [SD Onscreen Disp.]
- 2 Select [On] and then press SET.
  - DISP→ appears on the right side of the screen (when [∠ LCD/VF Setup] (Custom Display) (Output Display) is set to [On]).

# (i) NOTES

• Onscreen displays will not appear on an external monitor for SD output if [ \( \subseteq \subseteq \) Video Setup \( \subseteq \) [SD Output] is set to [Side Crop].



# **Audio Output**

The camcorder can output audio from the HD/SD SDI terminal (XFSOS only), HDMI OUT terminal, AV terminal or  $\bigcap$  (headphone) terminal. When audio is output from the AV terminal or  $\bigcap$  (headphone) terminal, you can configure settings such as the output channel. When audio is output from the AV terminal, you can select the output level.

### XF305 Embedded Audio

Embedded audio refers to the superimposing of the audio signal along with the video signal being output from the HD/SD SDI terminal. If you set the [Video Setup] [SDI Output] setting to [HD] or [SD], the camcorder will automatically embed audio.

Operating modes: CAMERA MEDIA

# [Audio Setup] [Audio Output] [Monitor Delay] [Normal]

### Synchronizing the Video with the Audio being Monitored

When audio is output from the AV terminal or  $\Omega$  (headphone) terminal, you can choose to synchronize the audio signal with the video signal or have the camcorder output the audio in real time. When the audio is output in real time, there will be a slight delay. Regardless of the setting, however, the audio and video signals recorded will be synchronized.

Operating modes: CAMERA MEDIA

- 1 Open the [Monitor Delay] submenu.
  - (Audio Setup) (Audio Output) (Monitor Delay)
- 2 Select the desired option and then press SET.

### **Options**

[Line Out]: Synchronizes the audio and video signals. [Normal]: Allows you to monitor the audio in real time.

### Selecting the Audio Channel

You can select the audio channel that is output from the AV terminal or  $\Omega$ (headphone) terminal.

channels.

[CH2/CH2]: Audio from CH2 is output from both the left and right audio

channels.

[All/All]: Audio from CH1 and CH2 is mixed and output from both the

left and right audio channels.

 You can change the audio channel by setting an assignable button to [Audio Output CH] ( 115).

### Selecting the Output Level of the AV Terminal

You can select the output level of audio that is output from the AV terminal.





You can take photos when the camcorder is in CAMERA mode or you can capture a photo from a clip when the camcorder is in MEDIA mode. Photos are saved onto the SD card. In CAMERA mode, photo size is 1920x1080\*. In MEDIA mode, photo size depends on the resolution setting of the clip that the photo is captured from. If the clip is 1920x1080 or 1440x1080, the photo size is 1920x1080. If the clip is 1280x720, the photo size is 1280x720.

\* At this size, the camcorder can save approximately 670 photos on a 1 GB SD card.

### Taking Photos in CAMERA Mode

You can take a photo while the camcorder is recording a clip or is in record pause mode. If a custom picture file is selected in advance, it will be recorded with the photo (\infty 117). To take a photo, set an assignable button to [Photo] first or use the wireless controller.

Operating modes: CAMERA MEDIA

- 1 Set an assignable button to [Photo] (115).
  - This step is not necessary if you are using the wireless controller.
- 2 Press the assignable button to take a photo.
  - Alternatively, press the PHOTO button on the wireless controller.
  - The so icon and the number of available photos appear on the upper right portion of the screen.
  - If a custom picture file is selected, it will be recorded with the photo.
  - The SD card access indicator will flash as the photo is being recorded.
- (i) NOTES
- Photos cannot be recorded when the [Gamma] setting in the custom picture file is set to [Hlt.Pri.].

# **Taking Photos**

### Capturing Photos in MEDIA Mode

You can capture a photo from a clip during playback pause. To capture a photo, set an assignable button to [Photo] first or use the wireless controller.

Operating modes: CAMERA MEDIA

- 1 Set an assignable button to [Photo] (115).
  - This step is not necessary if you are using the wireless controller.
- 2 Select the desired clip and press the ►/II button to start playback.
- 3 Pause the playback at the point you want to capture.
- 4 Press the assignable button to capture a photo.
  - Alternatively, press the PHOTO button on the wireless controller.
  - The screen will momentarily turn black as if a camera shutter had released.
  - The 🔁 icon and the number of available photos appear on the upper right portion of the screen.
  - The SD card access indicator will flash as the photo is being recorded.
- 5 Press the button to stop playback.
- IMPORTANT
- Observe the following precautions while the SD card access indicator is flashing. Failure to do so may result in permanent data loss.
  - Do not disconnect the power source or turn off the camcorder.
  - Do not remove the SD card.
- (i) NOTES
- If the LOCK switch on the SD card is set to prevent writing, you will not be able to record a photo. Change the position of the LOCK switch in advance.
- Even if the [Other Functions] [Custom Function] [Scan Reverse Rec] setting is set to [Both], [Vertical] or [Horizontal], photos will not be inverted.



### Displaying the [Photos] Index Screen

Display the [Photos] index screen to view photos.

- 1 Hold down the button on the POWER switch and move it to MEDIA.
  - The camcorder switches to MEDIA mode and the clip index screen appears.
- 2 Press the INDEX button.
  - The index screen selection menu appears.
- 3 Select [Photo Index] and then press SET.
  - The [Photos] index screen appears.
  - After you are finished viewing photos, press the INDEX button to return to the clip index screen.




### **Viewing Photos**

- 1 Move the orange selection frame to the desired photo.

# **Photo Operations**

You can use the photo menu to protect or unprotect a photo, delete a photo, or copy a custom picture file embedded in a photo. You can display the photo menu from the [Photos] index screen or photo playback screen.

### Using the Photo Menu

- 1 From the [Photos] index screen, select a photo and then press SET.
  - If you are viewing a photo, simply press SET.
  - The photo menu appears. Available functions depend on the photo's settings.
- 2 Select the desired function and then press SET.

### **Deleting Photos**

You can delete a photo you no longer need. When you do so, however, the custom picture file embedded in it will also be deleted. Photos can be deleted one at a time from the photo playback screen or [Photos] index screen.

Operating modes: CAMERA MEDIA

### Deleting a Photo from the Playback Screen

- 1 Display the photo to be deleted (11 163).
- 2 Press SET to open the photo menu.
- 3 Select [Delete] and then press SET.
  - The screen prompts you to confirm the operation.
- 4 Select [OK] and then press SET.
  - Select [Cancel] instead to cancel the operation.
  - The selected photo is deleted and the next photo is displayed.
  - If a custom picture file is embedded in the photo, it is also deleted.
- 5 When the confirmation message appears, press SET.

### Deleting a Photo from the Index Screen

- 1 Open the [Photos] Index Screen (\$\sum 163\$).
- 2 Move the orange selection frame to the photo to be deleted.
- 3 Press SET to open the photo menu.
- 4 Select [Delete] and then press SET.
  - The screen prompts you to confirm the operation.

- 5 Select [OK] and then press SET.
  - Select [Cancel] instead to cancel the operation.
  - The selected photo is deleted.
  - If a custom picture file is embedded in the photo, it is also deleted.
- 6 When the confirmation message appears, press SET.

### **Deleting All Photos**

- 1 Open the [Delete All Photos] submenu.
- 2 Select [OK] and then press SET.
  - All of the photos on the SD card will be deleted.
  - Select [Cancel] instead to cancel the operation.
  - While the photos are being deleted, you can press SET to cancel.
- 3 When the confirmation message appears, press SET.
- IMPORTANT
- Be careful when deleting photos. Deleted photos cannot be recovered.
- $(oldsymbol{i})$  notes
- Protected photos cannot be deleted.

### **Protecting Photos**

You can protect photos to prevent accidental erasure. The custom picture file embedded in such a photo is also protected. Photos can be protected from the photo playback screen or [Photos] index screen.

### Protecting a Photo from the Playback Screen

- 1 Display the photo to be protected.
  - Refer to Viewing Photos ( 163).
- 2 Press SET to open the photo menu.
- 3 Select [Protect] and then press SET.
  - To remove protection settings from a protected photo, select [Unprotect] instead.
  - The screen prompts you to confirm the operation.
- 4 Select [OK] and then press SET.
  - Select [Cancel] instead to cancel the operation.

### **Copying Custom Picture Files**

You can copy to the camcorder a custom picture file embedded in a photo. Custom picture files can be copied from the photo playback screen or [Photos] index screen.

Operating modes: CAMERA MEDIA

### Copying a File from the Playback Screen

- 1 Display the photo with the custom picture file to be copied.
  - Refer to Viewing Photos ( 163).
- 2 Press SET to open the photo menu.
- 3 Select [Copy [CP] File] and then press SET.
  - The [P Data 1/3] screen appears with the orange selection frame indicating the first file slot in the camcorder.
  - Alternatively, you can press the CUSTOM PICT. button.
  - You can push the joystick up/down or turn the SELECT dial to display the [P Data 2/3] and [P Data 3/3] screens.
- 4 Select the desired file slot in the camcorder and then press SET.
- 5 Select [OK] and then press SET.
  - The custom picture file embedded in the selected photo is copied, overwriting the file in that slot.
- 6 When the confirmation message appears, press SET.

### Copying a File from the Index Screen

- 1 Open the [Photos] Index Screen.
  - Refer to Viewing Photos (\$\sum 163\$).
- 2 Move the orange selection frame to the photo with the custom picture file to be copied.
- 3 Press SET to open the photo menu.
- 4 Select [Copy Pile] and then press SET.
  - The [P Data 1/3] screen appears with the orange selection frame indicating the first file slot in the camcorder.
  - Alternatively, you can press the CUSTOM PICT. button.
  - You can push the joystick up/down or turn the SELECT dial to display the [CP] Data 2/3] and [CP] Data 3/3] screens.
- 5 Select the desired file slot in the camcorder and then press SET.
- 6 Select [OK] and then press SET.
  - The custom picture file embedded in the selected photo is copied, overwriting the file in that slot.
- 7 When the confirmation message appears, press SET.
- (i) NOTES
- You cannot copy a custom picture file to a slot that is protected.

### **Photo Numbering**

Photos are automatically assigned consecutive numbers from 0101 to 9900, and stored on the SD card in folders containing up to 100 photos. Folders are numbered from 101 to 998. You can select the photo numbering method to be used.

The photo number indicates the name and location of the file on the SD card. For example, a photo numbered 101-0107 is located in the "DCIM\101CANON" folder as the file "IMG\_0107.jpg".

Operating modes: CAMERA

CAMERA MEDIA

- 1 Open the [Photo Numbering] submenu.
- 2 Select the desired option and the press SET.

### **Options**

[Reset]:

Photo numbers will restart from 101-0101 every time you insert a new SD card. If an SD card already contains photos, photo numbers will continue from the number following that of the last photo on the SD card.

[Continu.]:

Photo numbers will continue from the number following that of the last photo recorded with the camcorder. [Photo Numbering]


# Displaying the Status Screens

### 1 Press the STATUS button.

- The status screen most recently displayed will appear unless you turned off the camcorder or changed the operating mode. In such case, the [Camera] status screen appears in CAMERA mode and the [Buttons / Remote] status screen appears in MEDIA mode.
- 2 Push the joystick up/down or use the SELECT dial to scroll through the status screens.
- 3 When you are finished, press the STATUS button again to exit the status screens.
  - Alternatively, you can press the MENU or CUSTOM PICT. button. Doing so will exit the status screen and open the respective menu.





# Power source

#### The camcorder will not turn on or it turns off by itself.

- The battery pack is exhausted. Replace or charge the battery pack.
- Remove the battery pack and reattach it correctly.

#### Cannot charge the battery pack.

- The temperature of the battery pack is outside the charging range. If the battery pack's temperature is below 0 °C, warm it before charging it; if it is above 40 °C, let the battery pack cool down before charging it.
- Charge the battery pack in temperatures between 0 °C and 40 °C.
- The battery pack is faulty. Replace the battery pack.

#### The battery pack is exhausted extremely quickly even at normal temperatures.

- Check the [Battery / Hour Meter] status screen ( 179) to see whether the battery pack is at the end of its service life. If so, buy a new battery pack.

# Recording

#### Pressing the START/STOP button will not start recording.

- The CF card is full or it already contains the maximum number of clips (999 clips). Delete some clips (1144) or save your clips (1156) and initialize the CF card (1140) to free some space. Alternatively, replace the CF card.
- The START/STOP lock lever on the handle is set to a, rendering the handle's START/STOP button inoperable. Change the position of the lock lever.
- You may not be able to operate the START/STOP button while settings are being changed via the optional RC-V100 Remote Controller. Press the START/STOP button once you finish changing settings with the RC-V100.

# The point where the START/STOP button was pressed does not match the beginning/end of the recording.

- There is a slight interval between pressing the START/STOP button and the actual start/end of recording. This is not a malfunction.

#### The camcorder will not focus.

- Focus manually (\$\sum 53\$).
- The viewfinder is not adjusted. Use the dioptric adjustment lever to make the proper adjustment ( 31).
- The lens or Instant AF sensor is dirty. Clean the lens or sensor with a soft lens-cleaning cloth ( 196). Never use tissue paper to clean the lens.

# When a subject flits across in front of the lens, the image appears slightly bent.

- This is a phenomenon typical of CMOS image sensors. When a subject crosses very quickly in front of the camcorder, the image may seem slightly warped. This is not a malfunction.

#### Changing between recording ( REC) and record pause (STBY) takes longer than usual.

- When the CF card contains a large number of clips, some operations may take longer than usual. Save your clips (156) and initialize the CF card (156) and #### The camcorder cannot record to a CF card properly.

- This may occur as recordings are made and deleted over time. Save your clips ( 156) and initialize the CF card ( 40).

## After using the camcorder for a long time, it becomes hot.

- The camcorder may become hot after using it continuously for long periods of time; this is not a malfunction. If the camcorder becomes unusually hot or it becomes hot after using it only for a short while, it may indicate a problem with the camcorder. Consult a Canon Service Center.

# **Playback**

#### Cannot delete a clip.

- You cannot delete clips with an M mark. Remove the M mark ( 142) to delete the clip.

#### Deleting clips takes longer than usual.

- When the CF card contains a large number of clips, some operations may take longer than usual. Save your clips (156) and initialize the CF card (140).

#### Cannot delete a photo.

- The photo is protected. Remove the protection (120).
- The LOCK switch on the SD card is set to prevent accidental erasure. Change the position of the LOCK switch.

# Cannot copy clips.

- There is not enough available space on the CF card being copied to or the CF card already contains the maximum number of clips (999 clips). Delete some clips (144) to free some space or replace the CF card.

# **Indicators and Onscreen Displays**

# lights up in red.

- Battery pack is exhausted. Replace or charge the battery pack.

#### appears on the screen.

- The camcorder cannot communicate with the battery pack attached so the remaining battery time cannot be displayed.

# The tally lamps do not illuminate.

- Set [Other Functions] ( [Tally Lamp] ( [Front] or [Rear] to [On].

# 

- The battery pack is exhausted. Replace or charge the battery pack.
- There is not enough available space on the CF card. Delete some clips ( 144) to free some space or replace the CF card.
- A system error has occurred. Turn off the camcorder and back on again. If this does not solve the problem, consult a Canon Service Center.

# The tally lamps flash slowly. (1 flash per second)

- The combined available space on both CF cards is low. Replace the CF card that is not being recorded onto.

# F.Ring appears in red on the screen.

- The focus mode ring is not correctly set. Turn the ring to either AF/MF or FULL MF until the PUSH button locks (\$\sum\_{\text{5}} 53\$).

# appears in red on the screen.

- An SD card error occurred. Turn off the camcorder. Remove and reinsert the SD card. Initialize the SD card if the display does not change back to normal.
- The SD card is full. Replace the SD card or delete some photos ( 164) to free some space on the SD card.

# Even after stopping recording, the CF \(\mathbb{A}\)/CF \(\mathbb{B}\) access indicator stays illuminated in red.

- The clip is being recorded. This is not a malfunction.

# Picture and Sound

# Screen displays turn on and off repeatedly.

- The battery pack is exhausted. Replace or charge the battery pack.
- Remove the battery pack and reattach it correctly.

# Abnormal characters appear on the screen and the camcorder does not operate properly.

- Disconnect the power source and reconnect it after a short time. If the problem still persists, perform one of the following actions.
- Disconnect the power source and press the RESET button. This resets all the camcorder's settings to default values except for custom picture settings and the hour meter.

Use the [Other Functions] [Seset All Settings] function. This resets all the camcorder's settings to default values
except for the hour meter.

#### Video noise appears on screen.

- Keep a distance between the camcorder and devices that emit strong electromagnetic fields (plasma TVs, cellular phones, etc.).

#### Horizontal bands appear on the screen.

- This is a phenomenon typical of CMOS image sensors when recording under some types of fluorescent, mercury or sodium lamps. To reduce the symptoms, set [Camera Setup] ○ [Flicker Reduction] to [Automatic] (□ 67). This is not a malfunction.

#### The image on the screen appears too dark.

- When recording clips with the [Gamma] setting in the custom picture file set to [Hlt.Pri.], or when playing back such clips on the camcorder, setting [ LCD/VF Setup] [View Assistance] to [On] allows you to monitor the image at a brightness closer to that of the actual scene.

#### Audio cannot be recorded.

- The AUDIO IN switch is not set correctly (2 91).
- An external microphone connected to the XLR terminal requires phantom power. Set the XLR terminal switch to MIC+48V ( 93).

#### Audio is recorded at an extremely low level.

- The AUDIO LEVEL switch is set to M, and the recording level is set too low. Check the audio level meter on the LCD screen and adjust the audio level correctly ( 95).
- The microphone attenuator is on. Turn off the microphone attenuator of the built-in microphone (\$\sum 92\$) or external microphone (\$\sum 94\$).

#### Sound is distorted or is recorded at lower levels.

- When recording near loud sounds (such as fireworks, shows or concerts), sound may become distorted or it may not be recorded at the actual levels. Activate the microphone attenuator of the built-in microphone (☐ 92) or external microphone (☐ 94), or adjust the audio recording level manually.

# The picture is displayed correctly but there is no sound from the built-in speaker.

- Speaker volume is turned off. Adjust the volume (1138).
- If headphones are connected to the camcorder, disconnect them.

# Recording Media and Accessories

#### Cannot insert the recording media.

- The CF card or SD card you are trying to insert is not facing the correct direction. Turn it over and insert it.

### Cannot record on the CF card.

- A compatible CF card must be used ( $\bigcirc$  37).
- Initialize the CF card ( $\bigcirc$  40) when you use it with the camcorder for the first time.
- The CF card is full or it already contains the maximum number of clips (999 clips). Delete some clips ( 144) to free some space or replace the CF card.

# Cannot record on the SD card.

- Initialize the SD card ( 40) when you use it with the camcorder for the first time.
- The LOCK switch on the SD card is set to prevent accidental erasure. Change the position of the LOCK switch.
- The SD card is full. Delete some photos (🗀 164) to free some space or replace the SD card.
- The folder and file numbers have reached their maximum value. Set the [Other Functions] [ [Photo Numbering] setting to [Reset] and insert a new SD card.

#### Recording to and playing back from a CF card is slow.

- This may occur as video is recorded/deleted over time. Save your clips ( 156) and initialize the CF card ( 40).

# Recording to and playing back from an SD card is slow.

- This may occur as photos are recorded/deleted over time. Save your photos and initialize the SD card (\$\sup\$ 40).

# The wireless controller will not work.

- Set [Other Functions] [ Wireless Controller] to [On].
- Replace the battery of the wireless controller.

# Connections with External Devices

Video noise appears on a nearby TV screen.

 When using the camcorder in a room where a TV is located, keep a distance between the AC adapter and the power or antenna cables of the TV.

# Playback looks fine on the camcorder but there is no image on the external monitor.

- The camcorder is not connected correctly to the external monitor. Make sure you are using the correct connection ( 151)
- The video input on the external monitor is not set to the video terminal to which you connected the camcorder. Select the correct video input.

#### There is no sound from the external monitor.

- When connecting the camcorder to an external monitor using the DTC-1500 Component Video Cable, make sure to connect also the audio connections using the white and red plugs of the optional STV-250N Stereo Video Cable.

# The camcorder is connected using a commercially available HDMI cable, but there is no picture or sound from the external monitor.

- Disconnect the HDMI cable and then restore the connection or turn the camcorder off and then on again.

#### The computer does not recognize the camcorder even though the camcorder is connected correctly.

- Disconnect the USB cable and turn off the camcorder. After a short while, turn it on again and restore the connection.
- Connect the camcorder to a different USB port on the computer.

# The image on an external monitor appears too dark.

- When using an external monitor or computer screen to check clips being recorded with the [Gamma] setting in the custom picture file set to [Hlt.Pri.], or to play back such clips, increasing the screen's brightness is recommended.

# **List of Messages**

Refer to this section if a message appears on the screen. The messages in this section appear in alphabetical order.

#### Accessing CF A/CF B Do not remove

- You opened the CF card slot cover while the camcorder was accessing the CF card. Close the CF card slot cover.
- You opened the CF card slot cover while the camcorder was recording in double slot recording mode. Close the CF card slot cover.
- During double slot recording, both "CF A" and "CF B" will appear in the message.

# Cannot acquire battery information

- Battery information can be displayed only for batteries bearing the Intelligent System mark.

# Cannot communicate with the battery pack. Continue using this battery pack?

- You attached a battery pack that does not bear the Intelligent System mark.
- If you are using a battery pack that bears the Intelligent System mark, there may be a problem with the camcorder or battery pack. Consult a Canon Service Center.

#### Cannot play back

- The file control information is corrupted or there was a decoder error. Turn off the camcorder and back on again. If this does not solve the problem, consult a Canon Service Center.
  - Corrupted file control information cannot be recovered. CF cards or clips with corrupt file control information cannot be read by the Canon XF Utility software or associated plugins.

#### Cannot record

- The file control information is corrupted or there was an encoder error. Turn off the camcorder and back on again. Then, remove the CF card being used and reinsert it. Alternatively, replace the CF card. If this does not solve the problem, consult a Canon Service Center.
  - Corrupted file control information cannot be recovered. CF cards or clips with corrupt file control information cannot be read by the Canon XF Utility software or associated plugins.

#### Cannot switch CF card slots

 The SLOT SELECT button was pressed while the camcorder is recording. Wait until recording is finished to change the selected CF card slot.

#### CF A→CF B / CF B→CF A Switched

- This message appears when you use the SLOT SELECT button to switch the CF card slot in use or recording continued from one CF card to the other.

#### CF A→CF B / CF B→CF A Will switch in a moment

- The CF card is almost full so recording will continue on the other CF card in approximately 1 minute.

#### CF A/CF B Buffer overflow. Recording was stopped.

- The data transfer rate was too high for the CF card in use and the recording was stopped. Use a recommended card ( 37).

#### CF A/CF B Cannot restore

- Could not recover data on the CF card. Save your clips (\$\sum 156\$) and initialize the CF card (\$\sup 40\$).

#### CF A/CF B error

 The CF card cannot be recognized or cannot be accessed. Check that the CF card is inserted correctly and not malfunctioning.

# CF A/CF B Management data is not supported and will be deleted

- This message may appear if you insert into the camcorder a CF card that was initialized by another Canon professional camcorder. Check the contents of the CF card.

#### CF A/CF B Management file error Cannot record

- Cannot record because the camcorder cannot write to the file control information. This may occur if the files on the CF card were accessed using another device. Save your clips (

  156) and initialize the CF card (

  40).
  - During double slot recording, both "CF A" and "CF B" will appear in the message.

# CF A/CF B Media full

- CF card A or CF card B is full so recording will not start. Switch to the CF card in the other CF card slot to record.

#### CF A/CF B Media is not supported

- CF cards that are less than 512 MB or not UDMA-compatible cannot be used with the camcorder. Use a recommended CF card (☐ 37).

## CF A/CF B Number of clips already at maximum

- The CF card already contains the maximum number of clips (999 clips). Replace the CF card or use the CF card in the other CF card slot.
- Because both CF cards reached the maximum number of clips, double slot recording is not available.
- During double slot recording, both "CF A" and "CF B" will appear in the message.

# CF A/CF B Using a card that supports UDMA mode 4 or higher is recommended

- The CF card's UDMA mode is lower than UDMA4. We recommend using a CF card that with a UDMA mode of at least UDMA4.

# Change the battery pack

- The battery pack is exhausted. Replace or charge the battery pack.

# Check data on CF A/CF B Initializing the card is also recommended

- The CF card cannot be used for any of the following reasons.
  - A problem has occurred with the CF card.
  - The camcorder cannot read the CF card's data.
  - The CF card was initialized using a computer.
  - The CF card has been partitioned.
- Save your clips ( 156) and initialize the CF card ( 40).

#### Check the SD card

- The SD card cannot be accessed. Check that the SD card is inserted correctly and not malfunctioning.
- Due to an SD card error, photos cannot be taken or viewed. Remove and then reinsert the SD card or use a different SD card.

#### Cover is open

- The CF card slot cover was open when the camcorder was switched to or turned on in [CAMERA] mode. Close the cover.

#### Data on CF A/CF B needs recovering Attempt to recover?

- If data on the CF card is corrupted, such as when the power suddenly turned off while recording, the data must be recovered. When this message appears, select [Yes] and press SET.

Do not disconnect the USB cable or the power source until you safely end the connection from the computer. Cannot write data with this connection. To write data to the camcorder, connect the compact power adapter then reconnect the camcorder and computer.

- The camcorder cannot be operated while it is not being powered by the AC adapter and is connected to a computer with a USB cable. In addition, clips cannot be written back to the camcorder. To avoid corrupting the data on the CF card, use the computer's Safely Remove Hardware function to end the connection and disconnect the USB cable before using the camcorder.
- To be able to write back clips to the camcorder, use the computer's Safely Remove Hardware function to end the connection, disconnect the USB cable, power the camcorder using the AC adapter and only then connect it to the computer again.

Do not disconnect the USB cable or the power source until you safely end the connection from the computer. Connect the compact power adapter

- When the camcorder is in MEDIA mode and is connected to the computer with a USB cable, the camcorder cannot be operated. Disconnecting the USB cable or power source while this message appears may result in permanent loss of the clips on the CF card. Use the computer's Safely Remove Hardware function to end the connection and disconnect the USB cable before using the camcorder.
- To be able to write back clips to the camcorder, power the camcorder using the AC adapter and only then connect it to the computer using a USB cable.

#### File name error

- The folder and file numbers have reached their maximum value. Set [Other Functions] [ [Photo Numbering] to [Reset] and delete all the photos on the SD card ( 164) or initialize it ( 40).

#### Invalid operation

- The following operations cannot be performed.
  - Adding a shot mark to a clip that already has a shot mark or to a clip in frame recording mode or interval recording mode.
  - Adding an ™ mark to clip that already has an ™ mark or adding a ✓ mark to a clip that already has a ✓ mark.
  - In CAMERA mode, immediately reviewing a recording made in a special recording mode.
  - Pressing the START/STOP button when there is no CF card in the camcorder.

#### Media full

- CF card A and CF card B are full. Delete some clips (🛄 144) to free some space or replace a CF card.

#### Media is almost full

- The amount of available space on CF card A and CF card B combined is low. Replace the CF card that is not selected.

#### No clips

- There are no clips on the CF card to play back. Clips must be recorded ( 43) in order to play them back.

#### No photos

- There are no photos on the SD card to play back. Photos must be taken (\$\sum\$ 161) in order to view them.

## No Shot Marks

- This message appears if shot marks in a clip were deleted from the [Shot Mark] index screen. Press the INDEX button to return to the clip index screen.

# Number of Shot Marks at maximum

- The shot mark could not be added because the clip already contains 100 shot marks ( and marks combined). You must delete shot marks ( 147) before adding any more.

# Recorded in NTSC standard Check data on CF A/CF B Initializing the card is also recommended

- The CF card contains clips that are recorded in the NTSC system. Save your clips ( 156) and initialize the CF card ( 40).

#### Recording was stopped.

- When recording a single clip for an extended period of time, the clip will be split into smaller video files every 2 GB. This message will appear when the number of smaller video files reaches 99.

#### SD card arro

- You inserted a MultiMedia Card (MMC) into the camcorder. Use a recommended SD card (\$\sum\_37\$).

#### Shot Mark Error

- Could not add a shot mark. If the message appears in CAMERA mode, try adding the mark again. If that does not work, add the mark in MEDIA mode after you finish recording. If the message appears in MEDIA mode, turn off the camcorder and then back on. Then, try to add the mark again.

#### System error

- Turn off the camcorder and back on again. If this does not solve the problem, there may be a malfunction with the camcorder. Consult a Canon Service Center.

#### This photo cannot be displayed

- You may not be able to display photos taken with other devices or image files created or edited on a computer.

#### ✓ Mark Frror

- Could not add a ✓ mark. If the message appears in CAMERA mode, try adding the mark again. If that does not work, add the mark in MEDIA mode. If the message appears in MEDIA mode, turn off the camcorder and then back on. Then, try to add the mark again.

#### **OK Mark Error**

- Could not add an M mark. If the message appears in MEDIA mode, try adding the mark again. If that does not work, add the mark in MEDIA mode. If the message appears in MEDIA mode, turn off the camcorder and then back on. Then, try to add the mark again.

# **Handling Precautions**

# Camcorder

Be sure to observe the following precautions to ensure maximum performance.

- Do not carry the camcorder by the LCD panel. Be careful when closing the LCD panel.
- Do not leave the camcorder in places subject to high temperatures (like the inside of a car parked under direct sunlight), or high humidity.
- Do not use the camcorder near strong electromagnetic fields such as near powerful magnets and motors, MRI
  machines or high-voltage power lines. Using the camcorder in such places may cause anomalies in the video or
  audio or video noise to appear.
- Do not use or store the camcorder in dusty or sandy places. The camcorder is not waterproof avoid also water, mud or salt. If any of the above should get into the camcorder it may damage the camcorder and/or the lens.
- Do not point the camcorder or viewfinder toward an intense light source, such as the sun on a sunny day or an intense artificial light source. Doing so may damage the image sensor or the camcorder's internal components. Be careful especially when using a tripod or shoulder strap. When you are not using the viewfinder, make sure to attach the viewfinder cap to the viewfinder.
- Be careful of heat generated by lighting equipment.
- Do not disassemble the camcorder. If the camcorder does not function properly, consult qualified service personnel.
- Handle the camcorder with care. Do not subject the camcorder to shocks or vibration as this may cause damage. When using the shoulder strap, do not allow the camcorder to swing and hit an object.
- To prevent equipment breakdowns and excessive heating, do not connect the supplied AC adapter to voltage converters for overseas travels or special power sources such as those on aircraft and ships, DC-AC inverters, etc.
- When mounting the camcorder on a tripod, make sure that the tripod's fastening screw is shorter than 5.5 mm. Using other tripods may damage the camcorder.

#### Long-term storage

If you do not intend to use the camcorder for a long time, store it in a place free of dust, in low humidity, and at temperatures not higher than 30 °C.

- Do not expose the battery pack to temperature higher than 60 °C. Do not leave it near a heater or inside a car in hot weather.
- Do not try to disassemble or modify it.
- Do not drop it or subject it to shocks.
- · Do not get it wet.
- Dirty terminals may cause a poor contact between the battery pack and the camcorder. Wipe the terminals with a soft cloth.

# **Handling Precautions**

# Long-term storage

- Store battery packs in a dry place at temperatures no higher than 30 °C.
- To extend the battery life of the battery pack, discharge it completely before storing it.
- Charge and discharge all your battery packs fully at least once a year.

# Always attach the battery terminal cover.

Do not allow any metal objects to touch the terminals (figure 1), as this can cause a short circuit and damage the battery pack. Attach the terminal cover whenever the battery pack is not being used (figure 2).

The battery terminal cover has a [ ]-shaped hole. This is useful when you wish to differentiate between charged and uncharged battery packs. For example, with charged battery packs, attach the terminal cover so that the [\_\_\_]-shaped hole shows the colored label.

## Remaining battery time

If the remaining battery time displayed is not correct, charge the battery pack fully. Still, the correct time may not be displayed if a fully charged battery pack is used continuously in high temperatures or it is left unused for long periods of time. Also, the correct remaining time may not be displayed, depending on the battery life. Use the time shown on the screen as an approximation.

# Regarding the use of non-Canon battery packs

- We recommend using genuine Canon battery packs bearing the Intelligent System mark.

- If you attach to the camcorder battery packs that are not genuine Canon battery packs, the remaining battery time will not be displayed.

# Recording Media

- We recommend backing up the recordings on the recording media onto your computer. Data may be corrupted or lost due to defects or exposure to static electricity. Canon shall not be liable for lost or corrupted data.
- Do not touch or expose the terminals to dust or dirt.
- Do not use recording media in places subject to strong magnetic fields.
- Do not leave recording media in places subject to high humidity and high temperature.
- Do not disassemble, bend, drop, or subject recording media to shocks and do not expose them to water.
- · Check the direction before inserting the recording media. Forcing recording media into the slot if it is not correctly oriented may damage the recording media or the camcorder.
- Do not attach any labels or stickers on the recording media.

# **Handling Precautions**

• SD cards: SD cards have a physical switch to prevent writing on the card so as to avoid the accidental erasure of the card's content. To write-protect the SD card, set the switch to the LOCK position.



# **Built-in Rechargeable Lithium Battery**

The camcorder has a built-in rechargeable lithium battery to keep the date/time and other settings. The built-in lithium battery is recharged while you use the camcorder; however, it will discharge completely if you do not use the camcorder for about 3 months.

To recharge the built-in lithium battery: Connect the AC adapter to the camcorder and use a power outlet to power the camcorder for 24 hours while it is turned off.

# WARNING!

- The battery used in this device may present a fire or chemical burn hazard if mishandled.
- Do not disassemble, modify, immerse in water, heat above 100 °C or incinerate the battery.

# Disposal

When you delete data on the recording media, only the file allocation table is altered and stored data is not physically erased. When disposing of or giving the recording media to another person, initialize it using the [Initialize Media] option for CF cards or [Complete] initialization option for SD cards ( $\bigcirc$  40). Fill it up with unimportant recordings, and then initialize it again using the same option. This makes recovering the original recordings very difficult.

# Cleaning

# Camcorder Body

Use a soft, dry cloth to clean the camcorder body. Never use chemically treated cloths or volatile solvents such
as paint thinner.


# Lens and Instant AF Sensor

- If the lens surface or Instant AF sensor is dirty, autofocus may not work properly.
- Remove any dust or dirt particles using a non-aerosol type blower brush.
- Use a clean, soft lens-cleaning cloth to gently wipe the lens using commercially available cleaning fluid for eyeglasses. Never use tissue paper.

#### LCD Screen

- Clean the LCD screen using a clean, soft lens-cleaning cloth.
- Condensation may form on the surface of the screen when the temperature changes suddenly. Wipe it with a soft dry cloth.

# Viewfinder



- 1 Slide the RELEASE switch in the direction of the of the arrow (1) and remove the viewfinder finder unit by sliding it as shown in the illustration (2).
- 2 Wipe away dirt with a cotton swab (3).
- 3 Reattach the viewfinder unit by sliding it back onto the camcorder (4).



• Be careful not to scratch the glass and screen when cleaning them.

#### Condensation

Moving the camcorder rapidly between hot and cold temperatures may cause condensation (water droplets) to form on its internal surfaces. Stop using the camcorder if condensation is detected. Continued use may damage the camcorder.

# Maintenance/Others

# Condensation may form in the following cases:

- When the camcorder is moved quickly from cold to warm places
- When the camcorder is left in a humid room
- When a cold room is heated rapidly

#### To avoid condensation

- Do not expose the camcorder to sudden or extreme changes in temperature.
- Remove the recording media and battery pack. Then, place the camcorder in an airtight plastic bag and let it
  adjust gradually to temperature changes before removing it from the bag.

# When condensation is detected

The precise time required for water droplets to evaporate will vary depending on the location and weather conditions. As a general rule, wait for 2 hours before resuming use of the camcorder.
